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
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

The Use of Project BIBO (Bridging Imperfections in Basic Operations) in Improving the Numeracy Rate of Elementary Schools in Candelaria East District

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ABSTRACT

This study focused on improving the numeracy rate of the various elementary schools in Candelaria East District in the Division of Quezon, Philippines through the implementation of Project BIBO (Bridging Imperfections in Basic Operations). Addressing the gap of the learners who are not fully capitalizing on the basic arithmetic and fundamental operations can be done by implementing various numeracy interventions. A descriptive research design was utilized in analyzing the numeracy rates of the participating elementary schools before and after the conduct of Project BIBO. Samples were randomly selected while descriptive statistics and tests of difference were used in analyzing and interpreting the data. After a one-year implementation of the said project, results showed a pre-numeracy rate of 85.54% with a standard deviation of 0.108 and a post-numeracy rate of 94.46 with a standard deviation of 0.032. A t-value of -3.592 and a p-value of 0.003 provided sufficient evidence to conclude at 0.05 level of significance that there is a significant difference between the pre-numeracy and post-numeracy rates. It is therefore reflected from the results that the implementation of Project BIBO has successfully improved the numeracy rating of the various elementary schools in Candelaria East District, and thus, the continuous implementation of the project is hereby recommended as future actions within the wider range of scope in the district level.

Assessment of Educational Leadership in Higher Education Institution (HEI) Towards School Policy Development

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ABSTRACT

This paper investigates the educational leadership in the Higher Education Institution (HEI) towards the development of the school policy. Mixed method research design is employed in the study, which deals with triangulation or Focus Group Discussion (FGD). Likewise, purposive sampling is utilized as the sampling technique. The study comprised thirty (30) respondents only. Results show that goals and expectation offer integrative approaches to leadership and implementation on productive support and response. Similarly, the resolution and alignment provides deeper understanding of school practice and discipline especially for instructional organization strategy and management for the improvement process. Furthermore, quality teaching support analyzes the value diversity, collaborative learning, and teachers professional learning while learning and development analyzes the goals and the sustainable organization and educational process relevant to teaching and learning development opportunity, outcome, and quality factors. Lastly, safe and orderly atmosphere supports the goals for an effective learning school system, strong leadership process, clear vision in the learning process, and creates a climate for better learning. This study concludes that there is a significant relationship between the educational leadership in the HEI and the school policy and development as observed by the participants.

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Self-Learning Module Assessment and Feedback in Mathematics

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ABSTRACT

This paper investigates the self-learning module in Mathematics to improve competency knowledge of students in Mathematics in terms of assessment and assessment feedback, suggestions and comments, advantages, and disadvantages of the self-learning process. Mixed methods are employed, which is a combination of quantitative and qualitative approach concentrated on Focused Group Discussion (FGD). Likewise, purposive sampling is utilized in gathering the sample size of the study. Hence, one hundred seventy-two (172) comprised the research participants. Results show that the self-learning module allows exploration of the learning process through self-explanation, self-pace, more freedom, hands on exposure, and detailed lesson. The participants were able to understand the principles, rules, and laws of integration learning process though it is difficult and hard to implement the self-learning assessment. The study argues the need to elaborate lessons with more examples, and to provide detailed and flexible lessons that students enjoy. It is highly recommended that teachers provide interaction and guidance during the classroom discussions because the learning process becomes is slow with the self-learning module.

Teachers' Technical Skills and Competence in Job-Related Information Communication Technology Applications

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ABSTRACT

This descriptive correlation survey study among 74 randomly selected Grades Four to Six teachers in Hamtic North District in Hamtic, Antique, for school year 2021-2022, assessed the Information Communication Technology (ICT) technical skills and competence of the teachers conducted from July to September 2022. Employing a researcher-made checklist duly validated and pilot tested based on the National Information and Communications Technology Competency Standards NICS-Basic of the Commission of Information and Communication Technology, readings and shared by the District ICT coordinator. Results of the present study showed that the teachers have outstanding level of ICT technical skills and competence in job-related ICT applications. Further, a positive high correlation among ICT technical skills and competence in job-related ICT applications was also noted in the present study. An enhancement program was advanced by the researcher.

Development and Validation of Instructional Materials in Problem Solving in Mathematics ¹Jessa D. Lorenzo & ²Rebecca T. Barrios

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ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to develop and validate the instructional material for problem solving in Mathematics for Grade 4 pupils in an elementary school at the District of Tangalan, SY 2023-2024. The design-based research was used in this study using IPO model. The participants were the 66 Grade 4 pupils and the 10 teacher-experts. Reading comprehension test and learning material evaluation tool were the data gathering instrument. The data were analyzed and interpreted using descriptive and inferential data analysis. The least learned competencies in mathematical problem solving of Grade 4 pupils were: solving routine and non-routine problems involving multiplication of whole numbers including money using appropriate problem-solving strategies and tools, solving multi-step routine and non-routine problems involving multiplication and addition or subtraction using appropriate problem-solving strategies and tools and solving multi-step routine and nonroutine problems involving division and any of the other operations of whole numbers including money using appropriate problem-solving strategies and tools. A Learning Activity Sheet was created based on the result of the study. The problem-solving skills in the pre-test were low while the post-test was moderate. There is a significant difference on the problem solving competence of Grade 4 pupils before and after the intervention using the learning activity sheets. The level of acceptability of the developed instructional material for grade 4 was very highly acceptable as to content, instructional quality, prints, design and layouts.

Pupils' Reading Comprehension: Basis for the Development of Reading Instructional Material ¹Kendra I. Tabanera & ²Rebecca T. Barrios

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ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to assess the reading comprehension among the Grade 4 pupils in an Integrated School in the District of Tangalan. The result of the study was the basis on the development of an instructional reading material. The design-based research was used in this study using IPO model. The participants were the 66 Grade 4 pupils and 10 teacherexperts. Reading comprehension test and learning material evaluation tool were the data gathering instrument. The data were analyzed and interpreted using descriptive and inferential data analysis. The result showed that the reading comprehension in English of Grade 4 pupils is low. Based on the result of the study, an instructional material was developed. The instructional material offered a variety of engaging activities, including word boxes, missing letter challenges, collaborative group activities, reading experiences, interactive games, and visual aids for descriptive analysis. The level of acceptability of the developed instructional material for Grade 4 was very highly acceptable as to content, instructional quality, prints, design and layouts. The level of reading comprehension of Grade 4 pupils before the intervention was low but after using the developed instructional material, it became moderate. Hence, there is a significant difference on the reading comprehension of grade 4 pupils before and after using the instructional material.

Lived Experiences of Multi-grade Teachers Teaching Mother Tongue Using Most Essential Learning Competencies (MELCs) ¹Lilianie N. Sosa & ²Sergio F Tolentino III

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ABSTRACT

The growth of teachers is significantly influenced by their lived experiences. This study aims to explore the lived experiences of seven multi-grade teachers teaching mother tongue using the Most Essential Learning Competencies (MELCs) in five primary schools in the District of Banga, Division of Aklan. It adopts the phenomenological research design. A purposive sampling was used in selecting the participants who were subjected to an in-depth interview to reveal their experiences using Collaizzi's method of analyzing the data and interpreting the results. As a result, multi-grade teachers always identify areas for adjustment/improvement, explore new strategies, and seek ways to improve their teaching practices to better implement the mother tongue MELC in multilevel settings. It implies that successful implementation of the mother tongue MELCs requires a holistic approach that addresses the challenges through targeted professional development, resource allocation, community engagement, and policy support. Continuous improvement, collaboration, and student-centered engagement are essential to increase the effectiveness of MTB-MLE and maximize its benefits to learners.

Lived Experiences of Elementary Teachers in Teaching English

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to identify the lived experiences of elementary teachers in teaching English in the Southern part of Antique. It utilized qualitative research design utilizing phenomenology as its methodology. The eight participants were teachers in the selected schools in the district particularly teachers who were teaching English subject for school year 2022-2023. They were asked to share their lived experiences, challenges encountered, and coping mechanisms they employed through one-on-one interview using the interview guide prepared by the researcher. The data gathered were coded and thematically analyzed. The findings revealed that elementary teachers teaching English encountered numerous challenges that hindered them in providing quality English teaching. Further, learner's behavior, diversity of learners, being attached to mother tongue, presence of nonreaders, poor comprehension skills, and lack of learning resources in the classroom were the factors that affected their delivery of instruction and discipline. To overcome this, they sought professional development, developed a positive mindset, sought advice from colleagues, developed flexibility, and resourcefulness despite the challenges. The findings offered recommendations for teachers, learners, Department of Education and parents of the changes in the practices they have done and collaborate with each other in order to improve the proficiency of learners in English.

The Lived Experiences of Elementary Learners in a School-less Community

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ABSTRACT

The study focused on the lived experiences of elementary learners in a school-less community. Its main purpose is to determine the struggles and coping mechanisms employed by these learners in obtaining basic education. This phenomenological research anchored on the Theory of Scarcity, utilized a researcher-made interview guide and focused group discussions to extract valid information from six elementary learner-participants, who were exclusively residents of Barangay Tabangka, one of the school-less communities in Numancia, Aklan. The data gathering process took place from October to December 2023. The lived experiences of school-less community learners in Barangay Tabangka involved a complex interplay of challenges, practical considerations, and personal preferences, shaping their educational journey with factors such as daily commute challenges, proximity to educational resources, and enjoyable aspects of education. The struggles encompassed financial constraints, safety concerns, difficulties in carrying books, and limited access to educational resources. Despite these challenges, learners exhibited resilience and resourcefulness, through the presence of family and community support and collaboration. Recommendations were made for learners to maintain a steadfast commitment to their studies, fostering a positive mindset, creating realistic study routines, seeking support, and embracing resilience with the help of the entire school community. Focusing on learners from Barangay Tabangka may limit the applicability of these findings to other communities. This implies that while the insights gained are valuable within the context of Barangay Tabangka, these should not be directly generalized to broader communities with different socio-economic backgrounds.

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to determine the lived experiences of teachers and Grade 11 students in the implementation of Brigada Pagbasa as a reading innovation to improve reading literacy. This study made use of phenomenological study where open-ended questionnaire was made to gather data that will be carefully recorded, transcribed, interpret, and individually categorized according to themes by conducting face to face individual interview. Results revealed that, teachers encounter students with different reading level and realize Brigada Pagbasa as a remarkable experience. Students during the implementation of Brigada Pagbasa encounter to learn new things, enhanced their reading skills and positive life changing experience. It has found out that both teachers and students encounter challenges in the implementation of Brigada Pagbasa. It was very common to teachers struggling in absenteeism, addressing reading difficulty and time management. While students are suffering in having a low self-esteem and anxiety, comprehension difficulty and managing time. The results showed that both teacher and students utilized the same coping mechanism to address difficulties and challenges experience. Those are seeking for help, having a positive mind set and time management.

Using Context Clues in Inferring Meaning: A Strategy for Vocabulary Development 1Vic T. Andrade & 2Celedonia Recabe Hilario

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ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to assess the effectiveness of using instructional materials focused on the use of context clues in inferring meaning as a strategy for vocabulary development. On the other hand, quasi experimental using the one group pre-test post-test was used as research design. The study utilized the Grade 5 pupils of a certain school in the District of Ibajay East, Division of Aklan, School Year 2023-2024 as research participants. Total enumeration was employed in this study. A researcher-made pretest and posttest was used as an instrument. After the test was answered, it was retrieved, reviewed, coded, encoded, and processed using the Statistical Package of Social Science (SPSS) Software v. 22. The level of vocabulary skills of Grade 5 pupils in the pretest was moderate. Based on the result of the pretest, an intervention using context clues in inferring meaning was introduced. A posttest was administered after the intervention and the result showed that the level of vocabulary skills of the participants was high. The mean gain score of the vocabulary skills before and after the exposure to the intervention was 13.57. As an output, a Learning Activity Sheet or instructional material was developed. Since the Philippine educational system has been facing myriad of problems due to poor reading comprehension which resulted to the increasing number of academically-challenged learners, the results of this study can be used as a basis to provide varied learning materials which will serve as supplementary tool for teachers to develop and enhance learners' vocabulary.

Teachers' Utilization of Positive Reinforcement ¹Joy M. Venegas & ²Sergio F. Tolentino III

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ABSTRACT

This study aims to know the lived experiences of teachers in utilizing positive reinforcements to improve the students' academic achievement. This study adapted a qualitative research design utilizing phenomenology as its methodology and a validated researcher-made interview guide questionnaire. This study was conducted at Initan Elementary School, located at Brgy. Initan, Sibalom, Antique, during the school year 2022-2023. Results revealed that there are four main types of reinforcements that the teachers use, namely: natural reinforcement, tangible reinforcement, social reinforcement, and token reinforcement. For the students in higher grade levels such as those from Grade 4, Grade 5, and Grade 6, social reinforcements are best used. On the other hand, students who are from the lower year levels such as Kindergarten, Grade 1, and Grade 2, and Grade 3, token reinforcements are more effective. It was further revealed that there are also instances where the teachers may encounter challenges in implementing positive reinforcement techniques inside the classroom. At the end of this study, an intervention program was proposed to help the teachers with the aforementioned struggles.

Lived Experiences of Non-Sped Teachers in Handling Pupils with Special Needs

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ABSTRACT

In Sibalom South District, Sibalom, Antique, there are only few licensed SPED teachers, so general education teachers need to cater to pupils with special needs. The purpose of this study is to identify the challenges that non- SPED teachers have while dealing with pupils with special needs following the resumption of face-to-face classes. The study adopts Parker and Endler's modification of Lazarus and Folkman's stress and coping theory involving problem-solving approaches, emotional responses, and distraction techniques. A phenomenological qualitative research design was utilized, drawing experiences from eight non-SPED teachers from Sibalom South District during focus discussion for a month. Results showed that teachers face varying manifestations of special needs, necessitating them to adjust their teaching strategies based on each child's learning style. Moreover, passion is the driving force in teaching but the lack of sufficient education and training in SPED pedagogies hinders them from providing the best support. In order to deal with stress, the teachers use positive coping. Positive reinforcement and assessment methods were used to cope with their lack of teaching skills. Non-SPED teachers in inclusive classrooms face difficulties like not having enough training, dealing with stress, and adapting teaching strategies. It is recommended that they should be provided with training and seminars regarding SPED pedagogies to support students with special needs properly.

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ABSTRACT

The purpose of this qualitative phenomenological research study was to investigate the lived experiences, opportunities and challenges, and coping mechanisms of seven school heads in the performance of their duties assigned in Sibalom South District. This study utilized qualitative research design in phenomenological approach to analyze the participants' leadership experiences, leadership challenges, and coping strategies. The research employed various data collection techniques, including unstructured interview guide with open ended questions. Through interviews, school heads provided valuable insights into their daily responsibilities, coping mechanisms, and interactions with stakeholders. The result showed that their lived experiences in the performance of their duties and responsibilities have varied roles such as instructional leaders who involve themselves in setting clear goals, allocating resources to instruction, managing the curriculum, monitoring lesson plans and evaluating teachers; administrative leaders who make decisions about budgets, staffing, and facility management. They faced challenges in performing their duties and responsibilities in helping teachers improve their skills, developing curriculum, creating harmonious relationship, insufficient resources, poor technological skills and strengthening school and community relationships. In their capacity as school heads, they have the power to influence student learning outcomes, the growth of individual and professional educators, the creation of a supportive learning environment, the networking and connections of both internal and external stakeholders, and the overall success of the institution.

Mastery Learning Strategy on General Mathematics Performance ¹Jane Z. Oquendo & ²Mikko Jan D. Lopez

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to determine the effectiveness of mastery learning strategy on general mathematics performance of Grade 11 Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Students of Boracay National High School in the District of Malay during the School Year 2023- 2024. The pretest-posttest control group design using match paired subjects were utilized in this study. Twenty students were involved in this study where 10 students per group comprised the experimental and control groups. The control group was taught using the traditional way of teaching while the application of mastery learning strategy were used in the experimental group. The statistical tools used were the frequency, sum, percentage, mean and standard deviation for descriptive statistics, t- test for dependent samples, t- test for independent samples and Cohen's D for inferential statistics. Findings revealed that there was an improvement in the mean score of the control group but remains in the proficient level and those students taught with MLS got a higher mean score that made them to attain the high proficient level. There was a significant difference between the level of general mathematics performance of students.

Effect of Graphic Organizer on the Reading Comprehension of Pupils

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ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to examine the effectiveness of graphic organizer as intervention for the reading comprehension of Grade 3 learners in Elementary, District of Malay for SY 2022-2023. The quasiexperimental research design was employed in this study. The participants of the study were randomly selected 40 pupils and they were match-paired based on their Academic Performance in English. Then, twenty (20) pupils for control group and twenty (20) pupils for experimental group. Percentage, mean, Mann-Whitney U Test, and Wilcoxon Signed Rank Test were used to compare the effectiveness of graphic organizer as intervention to enhance the reading comprehension of the students. A pre-test conducted for both the control group (conventional method) and experimental group (graphic organizer) showed "did not meet expectation". After the implementation of interventions, post-test results showed that control group exhibited "did not meet expectation" while experimental group revealed an "outstanding" result. When the pre-test results of both groups were being compared, the result revealed that there is no significant difference between the mean score of both groups and it is concluded that both groups have the same level of prior knowledge. On the other hand, the result of comparison between the pre-test and post-test results of control and experimental groups exhibited that there is significant difference. For this reason, both the conventional method and the utilization of graphic organizer proved to be effective. Nevertheless, the post-test results of both groups were being compared and the result revealed that there is significant difference between the mean scores. Consequently, it is concluded that supplementation of graphic organizer enhanced the pupils' reading comprehension better than conventional method. Hence, the study recommended that graphic organizer can be integrated in teaching and learning English for constant enhancement of the competency level in English.

Peer-Assisted Reading Technique (PART): A Reading Comprehension Remediation Tool ¹Dynabel B. Banayo & ²Celedonia Recabe Hilario

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ABSTRACT

The study aimed to assess the effectiveness of the Peer-Assisted Reading Technique (PART) in improving the reading comprehension of Grade 4 pupils in an elementary school in the District of Ibajay West, Division of Aklan for the School Year 2023-2024. The research involved 14 Grade 4 pupils acting as peer tutors (little teachers) and 14 designated as peer pupils (little pupils). An experimental method using the pretest-posttest single design was utilized in this study. The pre-test showed that Grade 4 pupils had a developing level of reading comprehension skills. To address this, an intervention in the form of the Peer-Assisted Reading Technique (PART): A Reading Comprehension Remediation Tool was introduced. After the intervention, the post-test revealed a substantial improvement in the pupils' reading comprehension skills, with a mean score gain of 15.64, indicating an advanced level of proficiency. As a result of the study, a Learning Activity Sheet (LAS) was developed to enhance the pupils' reading comprehension and engage them in an in-depth exploration of characters and themes within a selected text. Overall, the research provides a valuable tool for improving comprehension skills and instilling a passion for reading among learners.

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ABSTRACT

This phenomenological study aimed to capture the narratives of teachers on the full implementation of in-person classes at Ibajay Central School during the 2022-2023 school year. The purpose was to understand teachers' lived experiences, challenges, and coping mechanisms during this period. Seven teachers, selected through purposive sampling, participated in face-to-face interviews guided by a researcher-made interview tool. The study found that physical and psychological readiness was crucial for teachers in facing challenges and maintaining holistic health to enhance their teaching performance. It emphasized the importance of infrastructural preparedness by administrators for stakeholder protection during school reopening post-COVID-19. Teachers expressed excitement to return but also anxiety about the virus, indicating a psychological defense mechanism. The lockdown period had strengthened teacher-learner relationships through inclusion and long-distance interactions. Challenges included strict health protocol adherence, which hindered communication and productivity, and increased workload affecting the teaching-learning process. The extended lockdowns necessitated exhaustive preparations for reopening, focusing on addressing learners' learning gaps. Teachers employed differentiated learning to cater to multiple intelligences and preferences as coping mechanisms. The study recommended regular parent-teacher conferences to report children's progress, recognizing the significant time and effort required for such interventions.

Utilization of Fuller Method to Full Refresher Readers

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ABSTRACT

This qualitative research study was designed to explore the lived experiences of the six purposively selected teachers utilizing the Fuller Method and aiding in the enhancement of the Full refresher readers' reading and comprehension skills in the District of Sibalom South, Schools Division of Antique. A phenomenological research design was used as it seeks the real-life experiences of individuals and utilizes the narratives of their experiences and feelings, then transcribed and analyzed using coding, and thematic analysis of findings by comparing the results to the theoretical framework and the relevant studies cited. The findings indicated that utilizing the Fuller Method is very helpful for struggling learners to be proficient readers for a very short time. Their comprehension and spelling skills also improved. However, this method should be paired with other approaches that focus on letter and sound identification. It is the role of teachers to understand the learners' needs and reading gaps greatly help them to utilize the Fuller Method effectively. It is a rewarding experience for them to see learners improve their reading performance. As such, teachers are encouraged to incorporate the Fuller Method in their reading instruction. Stakeholders and community linkages are urged to support the school intervention programs and training to focus on enhanced learners' reading performance and ensuring the availability of reliable materials used in Fuller lessons. Similar studies may also be conducted to provide a more comprehensive understanding of the ongoing impact of the Fuller Method on reading proficiency.

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to explore the lived experiences of Grade 4 pupils in peer tutorial in Fornier Elementary School, District of Sibalom South, Schools Division of Antique. Participants were the 6 paired purposively selected learners, 3 served as tutors and 3 as tutees. A phenomenological approach research design was used. The researcher employed a qualitative approach, utilizing the actual verbatim narratives of the participants for analysis and interpretation. It highlighted the value of building teamwork, a sense of responsibility for learning and finding models and inspiration to do better in studies and life. Results revealed that the peer tutorial proves to be instrumental in cultivating good study habits and learning styles among pupils. It was a non-gender-biased kind of buddy-up system. Pupils felt fun in learning however, they were looking forward to the snacks at the end of every session and awards or incentives as a part of the reward and recognition initiative. Lived Experiences of Teachers Assigned with Multiple Auxiliary Tasks

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ABSTRACT

Teachers are often tasked with a range of auxiliary responsibilities that extend beyond their primary teaching responsibilities. The purpose of this research is to shed light on the intricate relationship between these auxiliary tasks and the professional responsibilities of teachers. This qualitative phenomenological research was designed to comprehensively explore and describe the lived experiences of teachers assigned with multiple auxiliary tasks. The study specifically focused on the perceptions, challenges, coping mechanisms, and best practices of teachers in various elementary schools in the District of Sibalom North, Division of Antique. Semi-structured interviews were conducted with nine active educators who have lived experiences on their multiple auxiliary tasks. The result showed the challenges faced by teachers including increased workloads, longer work hours, stress, and burnout, which can negatively impact teaching quality. Balancing primary tasks can disrupt work-life balance, leaving teachers with less time for personal pursuits and self-care, leading to frustration, disillusionment, and hindered professional fulfillment. Teachers face various challenges in the field of education, including time management, seeking support, intrinsic motivation, and emerging resilience. These coping mechanisms highlight teachers' adaptability and vulnerability. This research serves as a catalyst for systematic reform to alleviate burdens on educators and foster professional growth. By reinforcing teacher resilience and strengthening the foundation of education, we can cultivate thriving educational communities and ensure equitable opportunities for all learners.

This study used design-based research (DBR) leading to improved design interventions as well as improved local and generalizable theory. The study also used the Successive Approximation Model (SAM) for the systematic sequences of activities that can be used in the development of spelling supplementary materials. The participants were 19 Grade 4 learners in an elementary level and a validating team which includes research and English school coordinators to evaluate the evaluation tool. The researcher implemented the interactive game-based spelling supplementary materials for grade 4 learners which consists of interactive and engaging games; it was utilized to improve the learners' spelling skills. In the pretest, the result was moderate; after conducting and implementing the study, the result was very high. For the level of acceptability of the learning material tool, the result was very highly acceptable. The result shows that there is a significant difference in the pre-test and post-test on spelling acquisition. The crafted interactive game-based spelling supplementary materials for grade 4 learners has yielded positive outcomes and it is highly recommended and encouraged to be integrated in English class.

Development and Validation of Instructional Materials for Teaching Fraction ¹Analyn N. Millamena & ²Sergio F. Tolentino III

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ABSTRACT

This quantitative study aimed to determine the level of acceptability of the developed and validated instructional materials in teaching fraction among the Grade 5 pupils who are officially enrolled in Pis-anan Central School, District of Sibalom South, School Year 2023-2024. In this study, the design-based research using the analysis, design, development, implementation, and evaluation (ADDIE) model, which involve the process of developing and validating the instructional materials in teaching fraction. The respondents of the study were all the 47 Grade 5 pupils officially enrolled in Pis-anan Central School. Data collection strategies employed was design-based research using the ADDIE model. Data were gathered using the researcher-made instrument on instructional materials in solving fraction duly validated by the experts. Data were analyzed using the Statistical Packages for Social Sciences (SPSS) version 22. The findings of the study revealed while grade 5 pupils performed well in solving addition and subtraction fraction problems, they struggled with creating problems, particularly those involving division and multiple operations. The implementation of specially designed instructional materials addressing these least mastered competencies led to significant improvements in pupils' mastery levels of fraction operations, as evidenced by pre and posttest comparisons. Moreover, the instructional materials were highly accepted for their content quality and effectiveness in enhancing understanding and problem-solving abilities in fractions.

Lived Experiences During Work Immersion of Senior High School Students

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ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to determine the lived experiences of Senior High School students during their work immersion. Six Senior High School TVL students were selected using purposive sampling, and the researcher-made interview guide was used to capture the responses through faceto-face interviews. The data was analyzed and interpreted using the thematic analysis of Collaizzi's method. The instrument was content validated by a jury composed of four members. The findings of the study showed that the lived experiences of senior high school during their work immersion were categorized into four themes: interaction and socialization; responsibility and obedience; enhancement of work ethics and skills; and career growth. The challenges and problems encountered by the senior high school during their work immersion were categorized into the following themes: communication gap; time management conflict; supervisors' management and handling clients; religious consciousness; and demanding environment. Coping mechanisms of the Senior High School students in addressing the challenges in work immersion were categorized into the following themes: unity and cooperation; work ethics; optimism and resilience. It was concluded that students often face a wide range of situations and challenges. To ensure that the work immersion program has well-defined and exact learning objectives, it is recommended that it be aligned with the students' desired learning outcomes and the curriculum requirements of their academic program.

Transition Experiences of Multigrade School Teachers

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to find out how multigrade school teachers dealt with the processes of transitioning from the conventional classroom teaching to handling children of varied ages and learning abilities, and the challenges they faced and their coping mechanisms. Qualitative research design through indepth interviews and focus group discussion (FGD) were used to gather data while the phenomenological approach was employed to come up with the themes on their lived experiences, challenges and coping mechanisms. Seven (7) randomly selected multigrade school teachers from the District of San Remigio, Schools Division of Antique participated in this study. Four themes on their lived experiences came up: learner's diversity can be a source of empowerment, community immersion is enlightening, education is a lifeline, and learning is indeed a continuous process. Likewise, results revealed four themes on their challenges: limited learning resources and facilities, heavy workloads, difficulty in classroom management, and limited opportunity for technology-backed teaching and learning. As to their coping mechanisms, the themes that came up were: being resourceful, innovative and resilient, ability to collaborate and learn from each other, presence of active community support and strong faith in the power of prayer.

ES Claveria's Approach: Tool in Beginning Reading Among Kindergarten Learners ¹Jennifer M. Aniceto & ²Marianne L. Quimpo

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to determine the effectiveness of the ES Claveria's Approach, a tool for beginning reading instruction in the kindergarten at Elementary School in the District of Nabas. Using a quantitative approach that employed the pre-test vs. post-test method, twenty kindergarten learners were purposively selected for this study. Previous to being introduced to this approach, learners proved an above-average recognition of letters but below-average recognition of letter sounds. Nevertheless, after being exposed to the approach, they showed a perfect recognition of letters and above-average recognition of letter sounds. The results were further validated through a paired samples test, which recognized that there was a significant difference in learner performance before and after implementing the ES Claveria's Approach. This shows that introducing this approach certainly jammed their ability to recognize both letters and their matching sounds. Overall, these findings support the effectiveness and potential benefits of using the ES Claveria's Approach as a tool for beginning reading instruction in elementary schools. The study highlights how targeted approaches can boost early literacy development by focusing on detailed areas such as letter recognition and sound awareness. It could contribute to enhancing reading instruction strategies in kindergartens, eventually leading to upgraded literacy outcomes for beginning learners.

This study used the narrative analysis, a cluster of analytic methods for interpreting texts or visual data that have a storied form. The researcher conducted face-to-face interview wherein the participants were encouraged to talk freely and to tell stories using their words. Results revealed that the following themes are the perspective of the grade 8 students towards their choices: personal aspiration, shared reasons on choosing their TVE course choice, family influence and teacher influence. Elementary Learning Styles and Application of the Dunn and Dunn Learning Style Inventory Model ¹Mary Ann B. Navarez & ²Mary Cherry Lynn D. Tabernilla

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ABSTRACT

This study explored the diverse learning styles of elementary pupils at Bel-is Elementary School. It examined the application of the Dunn and Dunn Learning Style Inventory Model (DDL-SIM) to enhance educational outcomes. Recognizing the unique learning preferences of learners, the research aimed to bridge the gap in learning styles by implementing tailored teaching methods and strategies. Utilizing an explanatory mixed-methods research design, the study engaged all pupils using the complete enumeration sampling technique to ascertain their learning styles across five domains: environmental, emotional, sociological, physiological, and psychological, as defined by DDL. The survey questionnaire for the quantitative phase and the semi-structured interview guide questionnaire for the qualitative phase were employed, which underwent validity and reliability tests by the expert panel of evaluators. The study's data analyses utilized descriptive statistics, Spearman Rho correlation, and thematic analysis. As per the DDL-SIM, quantitative findings revealed significant emotional and physiological preferences, with significant relationships between demographic profiles and their learning styles. Qualitative insights underscored a holistic approach to learning as the generated major theme, emphasizing the interconnectedness of the following minor themes such as emotional intelligence, social dynamics, physical health, and environmental factors in the learning experiences. The study suggested that educators create tailored learning plans and gender-sensitive approaches and include emotional and physiological aspects in teaching. In support of varied learning styles, it promoted the DDL-SIM of educator's professional development and parent and community participation. Hence, the DDL-SIM recognizes and addresses each learner's unique preferences, promoting a more inclusive and successful learning environment.

Learning Preferences and Determinants of Learners

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ABSTRACT

Learning preferences among learners are influenced by a multitude of factors that impact how individuals interact with and comprehend educational content and it's influenced by their sociocultural background, which encompasses the norms, values, and experiences that learners bring to the educational environment. Cognitive styles pertain to the cognitive processes and information processing methods employed by individuals, which can exhibit significant variation among learners. Explicitly, this study focused on the level of determinants and learning preferences of elementary learners. Utilizing the descriptive-correlational research design with the adopted and modified survey-questionnaire to determine the determinant in the areas of family, personal, physical and environment, teacher and leering and their relationship to the learning preferences in the context of visual, auditory, and kinesthetic of the learners dealing with their academic pursuit. Grounded with Learning Style Model Theory to grasp learners learning preferences in connection to the dominated factor among learners. Each learner revealed in a self-reported survey questionnaire that among five areas of determinant, the teacher exposed as the most cause and visual was the most learning preferred by the learners. Apparently, the determinants have significant relation to learning preferences. Additionally, family is the key setting where children observe and imitate behaviors, acquire communication skills, and participate in diverse activities. Family interactions like storytelling, collaborative work, and hands-on experiences might impact a child's preference for auditory, visual, and kinesthetic learning. Family support and encouragement in these areas boost a child's confidence and interest in certain learning methods, making family a major influence on learning preferences.

Comic-Based Reading Materials: An Intervention for Reading Comprehension Difficulties Among Grade Eight Students of Habana Integrated School ¹Ma. Anthonette Montejo & ²Wifredo J. Nicolas

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ABSTRACT

Comics include comic books, graphic novels, webcomics, and illustrated texts. Text-image communication gives readers a unique multimodal experience. This unique combination of visual and textual features has educators and academics interested in comic-based reading materials' instructional potential. Specifically, this study focused on the comic-based reading materials as an intervention for reading comprehension difficulties of grade eight junior high school students regarding their reading comprehension level results during the conduct of Philippine Informal Reading Inventory (Phil-IRI): Utilizing the quasi-experimental one-group pretest-posttest design, this study determined the effectiveness of comic-based reading materials as an intervention for reading comprehension difficulties. Anchored to Schema Theory to grasp the cognitive framework that help learners to organize information from the memories and experiences using schemas to interpret new information and how prior knowledge and experiences influence perception, memory, and cognition within 44 selected students employing complete enumeration. The results showed that there are significant differences in the performance in English 8 of students between the pretest and posttest scores. Moreover, the comic-based reading materials were effective and c helpful for students to grasp challenging concepts. Hence, comic-based reading materials are beneficial in comprehending the contents of text, helping students improve their ideas, and interest in reading.

The Lived Experiences of Teachers in Teaching Pupils on Least Mastered Competencies in Reading ¹Cherry S. Rasco-Sacramento & ²Rebecca T. Barrios

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ABSTRACT

The study explored the lived experiences, challenges and coping mechanisms of teachers in teaching pupils on least mastered competencies in reading. The participants were seven (7) teachers teaching in Grades 1-3. Qualitative research using phenomenological approach was utilised in this study. The participants were chosen purposively. The data gathering instrument was the semi-structured interview guide developed for the study. The study used the Colaizzi's method in analysing data. Findings of this study revealed that teachers teaching in least mastered competencies in reading had positive and negative experiences. The positive experiences include motivating and rewarding experience, and happiness and satisfaction in teaching when they saw progress in the reading ability of their pupils. The negative experiences include difficulty and feelings of frustration in teaching. The teachers met challenges when they taught these least mastered competencies in reading. Poor retention skills, lack of home school collaboration, and attitude of pupils were among the problems met by the participants in the study. To cope with the challenges, teachers utilise technology, conduct remedial lessons, and use instructional materials, varied approaches and strategies to motivate learners

Effectiveness of using Differentiated Instruction in Improving Learners' Performance in General Mathematics

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ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to determine the effectiveness of using differentiated instruction in improving learners' performance in general mathematics. The participants were forty (40) Grade 11 students during the school year 2023-2024. A total of 20 students were assigned to the experimental group, which was taught using differentiated instruction, and 20 students were assigned to the control group, which was taught using non-differentiated instruction or conventional methods. This study employed a quasi-experimental design, specifically the matching-only pre-test-post-test control group design. Percentage, mean, Mann-Whitney U Test, and Wilcoxon Signed Rank Test were used to compare the effectiveness of using differentiated instruction and conventional methods in improving learners' performance in general mathematics. The pre-test result showed that the control group had a mean score of 5.40, while the experimental group had a mean score of 5.35. The posttest results revealed that the mean scores of the control group had increased to 12.25 and the experimental group to 12.70, with a mean gain of 6.85 and 7.35, respectively. The study indicated that there is no significant difference in the mathematics performance level of students in the control group (mean score = 12.25) and the experimental group (mean score = 12.70) at the 0.05 level of significance (z-value = -0.276, p > .05). However, both groups mean scores notably increased, and this positive mean gain implies improvement in performance, indicating that differentiated and nondifferentiated (conventional) instructions of teaching were both effective in improving learners' performance, thus teachers can use both strategies in their teaching.

Let us Play: An Innovative Learning Approach in Learning English Vocabulary

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ABSTRACT

This study on the effectiveness of gamified learning as part of the lesson in English of Grade 8 wanted to test its effectiveness on the learner's vocabulary skills. Fifteen grade 8 learners were chosen as part of the controlled and experimental group, wherein the controlled group were subjected to conventional teaching and the experimental group were given gamified instruction. Using the 50-item researcher-made English proficiency test, conventional group achieved an average proficiency level while the experimental grouped achieved a significantly high mean score interpreted as good proficiency. Results of the post-test of both the conventional and gamified approaches showed positive increase to the scores of learners indicating that both approaches were effective in the delivery of learning. The findings suggest that the gamified approach was more effective than the conventional method in enhancing English vocabulary skills among grade 8 students. The study highly recommends gamification and gamified learning be integrated in the teaching process and be included in the curriculum. There could be a focus on developing educational resources and materials that align with gamified approaches, providing teachers with the necessary tools to integrate these strategies seamlessly. Curriculums should not be limited to the usual classroom instruction but should encourage educators to innovate.

Development and Validation of Podcast as Supplementary Listening Material for Grade IV Learners

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to assert the potential of the developed podcast to be used as a supplementary material in enhancing the listening skills of grade 4 learners. This study used 4D model by S Thaigarajan. Semmuel, and Semmuel in 1974 as cited by Hirayato (2022), namely; define, design, development and disseminate. The participants were the thirty-six (36) grade four learners. The percentage, mean, frequency, were used to analyze the competencies in pre-test and post-test. The pre-test resulted as low in listening competencies with the mean score of 16.58. After the implementation of the developed podcast, post-test was conducted, which resulted as moderate with the mean score of 24.47. Podcast showed improvement in listening skills of the learners. When the pre-test and post-test result were compared using the dependent t-test at a=0.05 level of significance, the significant difference of the pre-test and post-test was highly significant with -7.865p<.05 at .05. The level of acceptability in terms of content quality, instructional quality, technical quality and other findings of the developed podcast were highly acceptable with a mean score of .75.

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ABSTRACT

The purpose of this study was to describe the lived experiences, challenges, and insights of teachers in an elementary school in the District of Pandan, Division of Antique, which were the basis of the proposed intervention program for teachers. On the other hand, phenomenology research design was used in this study. The study utilized five elementary teachers as research participants. The data was analyzed and interpreted using thematic analysis of Collaizzi's method. The research instrument used was in the form of interview guide. The teachers' lived experiences with home visitation highlights three key themes: teacher's commitment and mission, student's struggles, and school-family connectedness. A qualitative research using phenomenological approach and thematic analysis method through an in-depth semi-structured faceto-face interview, utilizing a semi-structured interview guide developed for the study, was conducted among six (6) purposively identified teachers-in- charge in elementary schools in the District of Malinao, Aklan, S.Y. 2022-2023. Findings of this study revealed that participants are preoccupied, overloaded, overworked, yet they find their job fulfilling. This study provides factual information on the status quo of teachers-in- charge performing ancillary workloads for intervention programs and serves as reference for future researchers on the conduct of related study.

Blended Learning Modalities Management in the District of Madalag, Aklan

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ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to determine the blended learning modalities management in the district of Madalag, Aklan. Specifically, it sought to answers to teachers' demographic profile, the relationship between the extent of factors that affect the blended learning modalities management and the level of teachers' readiness. It was participated by 114 secondary school teachers via total enumeration sampling. While most respondents agreed on the extent to which human, institutional, and learning variables affects the implementation of blended learning management, the results showed that teachers were only moderately equipped to teach blended learning in terms of internet connectivity, gadget availability, and instructional skills. The relationship between the profile in terms of sex and teachers' level of readiness in blended learning modalities management is significantly related. Furthermore, there is also a significant relationship between the sex and educational attainment to the extent of factors affecting blended learning modalities management. Using the Chi-square test of correlation, it was demonstrated that the factors affecting the blended learning modalities management and teachers' preparedness level had no significant relationship and verbally interpreted as strong positive correlation. Therefore, to improve teachers' capacity for educational upgrading, they are encouraged to pursue postgraduate degrees. Additional financial support should also be given with the assistance of some private sector organizations and local government units to set up free WiFi hotspots and additional devices in public areas like plazas and barangay halls so that teachers and students can use other remote learning resources like online platforms, radio, and television instructions.

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ABSTRACT

This study investigates the post-pandemic challenges faced by teachers in face-to-face classroom settings, emphasizing the crucial role of education and educators amidst technological advancements. The purpose is to explore teachers' lived experiences, challenges encountered, coping mechanisms employed, and propose effective interventions. Drawing from Lazarus and Folkman's Transactional Model of Stress and Coping, the study examines how teachers perceive and manage classroom stressors. A phenomenological research design was used, focusing on elementary teachers with over 10 years of tenure at Valderrama Elementary School in Culasi, Antique. Data was collected through face-to-face interviews guided by a structured protocol, and qualitative data was meticulously organized and analyzed. Findings reveal a range of challenges including adaptation difficulties, emotional strain, behavior management issues, systemic changes, and broad responsibilities. Teachers demonstrated resourcefulness through flexibility and resilience. Proposed interventions include structural consistency, professional development, student engagement, mental health support, and focused training. Despite these obstacles, teachers show dedication and passion for fostering positive learning environments. The study highlights the need for flexible teaching strategies in evolving educational landscapes and recommends fostering good study habits, adaptable teaching approaches, curriculum refinement, robust teacher training, and documenting best practices for future research. Addressing these challenges is essential for creating conducive learning environments in modern classrooms. Research limitations include the specific context of the study, which may affect the generalizability of the findings.

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ABSTRACT

This study explored the lived experiences of teachers in dealing with slow readers, which can serve as basis for reading proficiency program. The research participants were six selected elementary English and Filipino teachers in the District of Batan in Kalibo, Aklan, specifically teachers handling slow reader students. This study utilized the phenomenological approach to determine the teachers' lived experiences in dealing with slow readers. The study results showed that the reading comprehension problems are the main focus of most teachers' lived experiences with their slow reader students. In addition, the majority of participants' experiences with the difficulties associated with teaching slow readers center on providing and executing tailored instruction to their pupils who are slow readers. More help and targeted strategies are often needed to support the acquisition and understanding of slow readers. Furthermore, as it takes more time and effort to ensure that every one of their slow reader students fully understands the instructions offered, the majority of participating instructors acknowledged difficulties when it comes to providing differentiated teaching to their slow reader pupils. Team Reading: It's Effect on Improving Reading Comprehension

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ABSTRACT

This inquiry sought to determine the effectiveness of using team reading approach for developing reading comprehension skills of grade 5 learners. The subjects of the study were split into six (6) groups with two performing learners leading each group. In the course of data analysis, the results obtained from these team leaders were excluded and therefore only twenty-four (24) set of scores were analyzed. Using quantitative approach employing the pretest vs. post-test method to thirty-six (36) learners purposively selected for this study, it was found that before the introduction to the team reading approach, learners demonstrated low mastery of reading comprehension skills. It was also later found after they were introduced to the approach that they demonstrated average mastery of the reading comprehension skills. The paired samples test confirmed that there was a significant difference in the reading comprehension of learners in identifying the main idea, identifying supporting details, clarifying meaning of content-based words, determining text types according to purpose and determining text types according to structure before and after they were introduced to the team reading approach. The findings of the study prompted the development of an action plan that targets the foundational reading comprehension skills identified in this study.

As an output of the study, a proposed reading program was prepared to help address the results of the study.

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ABSTRACT

This phenomenological study was conducted primarily to determine the lived experiences of kindergarten teachers on administering classroom assessment. Seven (7) teachers were included as participants of this study and were selected using purposive sampling. The researcher-made interview guide was utilized to capture the responses of the participants through the conduct of Face-to-Face Interview. The study highlights the importance of assessing children in school, ensuring interactive assessments to stimulate early-year learners' playful nature, and fostering patience and understanding to promote a healthy learning environment. It also highlights the role of diversity in modern education, allowing teachers to develop their creativity in creating meaningful and authentic learning materials for different learning preferences. Furthermore, participants believed that assessment is a critical component to classroom learning and helps guide decisions surrounding curriculum, instruction, and individualization hence, inability of the pupils to participate in assessment not only compromised the objectives assigned to the tasked but the totality of the purpose of the assessment. Teachers expressed concerns about an unreliable testing tool with a low percentage margin of errors, recommending a full review and revision of the assessment tool. Participants used various coping mechanisms to prevent negative progress in their problems, including remediation activities, rewards, superwoman status, interactive learning, and technology-based learning. These strategies were effective, positively influencing learners' attitudes towards learning and post-test performance. This only suggests the implication of differentiated activities as intervention to the learning and assessment of learning were quite beneficial.

Project Archimedes Video: Its Effectiveness to Student's Mastery of Mathematics ¹James C. Cahilig & ²Marianne Lao Quimpo

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ABSTRACT

This study focused on the effectiveness of Project ARCHIMEDES Video specifically video-lessons on the topics operation on function and solving rational equation and inequalities to students' mastery in Mathematics of grade 11 students of Union National High School, Academic Year 2023 - 2024. The quasi-experimental research design was employed, and the level of students' mastery were measured through the researcher-made test. The subjects are two selected sections of grade 11 of Union National High School. One section was the experimental group, and the other was control group. One group was composed of 25 students. The data was analyzed and interpreted using descriptive and inferential data analysis. The level of mastery before using Project ARCHIMEDES is low. On the other hand, the level of mastery in 'chalk and talk method' is low. The level of mastery after using Project ARCHIMEDES is very high while the level of mastery in 'chalk and talk method' is very high. There is no significant difference on the level of mastery in Mathematics before the exposure to Project ARCHIMEDES and chalk and talk method. There is no significant difference in the level of mastery in mathematics between the two methods before the exposure. There is no significant difference in the level of mastery in mathematics between the two methods after the exposure. However, there is a significant difference the level of mastery in Mathematics of Grade 11students before and after the exposure to Project ARCHIMEDES.

Error Analysis in Written Essays of Omani EFL Students

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ABSTRACT

This study investigated the linguistic errors made by Omani EFL students in their written essays at a discourse level. A descriptive method of research was utilized to gather information from twenty-five EFL undergraduate students' essays selected purposively to identify the linguistic errors from an error analysis viewpoint. The result shows that there are 15 linguistic errors found in the student's essays which are caused by interlingual and intralingual interferences. The result also exhibited that of 15 linguistics errors, spelling (88%), capitalization (80%), and punctuation errors (72%) are the most serious. This indicates that these errors are mechanical in nature which is the topmost errors with 51.12% when grouped into classification of errors due to the influence of mother tongue. It implies that participants' mother tongue (L1) contributed a lot to the mechanical errors committed. It can be gleaned that the participants are ignorant of the rule restrictions on the proper use of punctuation and capitalization as well as the rules on how to write the words correctly.

The Lived Experiences of Teachers on the Implementation of Blended Learning Modality ¹Alyssa S. Salmorin & ²Rhett H. Motus

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ABSTRACT

This phenomenological study aims to examine the teachers' experiences on the implementation of blended learning modality using an interview guide questionnaire. Seven teachers were selected using purposive sampling. An individual interview was conducted to collect data from the participants. Data from the interview were analyzed thematically using the Colaizzi's (1978) method. This study illustrated that the main challenge of teachers' experience is the lack of exposure and readiness in the implementation of blended learning. On the other hand, respondents had experienced mixed reactions towards blended learning modality. They emphasized the struggles in time management, stress from excessive workloads, slow connectivity, and unmotivated students in blended learning instructions. They cope up with the challenges by having more patience and understanding for students who were uninterested in blended learning modality, integration of messenger app for educational purposes, adjustment for additional workloads as they eventually become more flexible, and conducting home visitation for students without internet connection. This study may serve as a component towards the implementation of blended learning modality among teachers, particularly in rural areas who experienced the same situation.

Research Writing Capabilities of Master Teachers: Basis for Capability Enhancement Plan

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to help build a research culture in the basic education institutions particularly in the Division of Aklan by providing baseline information about the Master Teachers' (MTs) research capability as well as the factors predicting their capability thereby providing a research capability enhancement plan that can be used by the Department of Education to advance the research productivity. The study employed a mixedmethods approach with a sequential explanatory strategy in gathering the needed data. Quantitative data analysis using varied statistical tests yielded the following major findings: master teachers are capable in the following research capability dimensions: technical skills, conceptualizing research problems, and writing the methodology. However, in terms of research data processing and interpretation, they were assessed as moderately capable. This suggests that the master teachers' research capability is indeed low and would explain the reason for non-progressive research productivity. There is a correlation between research capability and the following variables such as educational attainment, research output, and mentorship. Four themes were generated from the issues encountered by the master teachers: knowledge and skill are accrual (the lack of knowledge and skill); input to training, output to efficiency (insufficient trainings), time is an element (time constraints); and support is an extra mile (lack of financial and moral support). The result provides a general implication that for any research capability enhancement plan to succeed, the Department of Education must emphasize the importance of knowledge, trainings, and institutional support as driving forces toward research productivity.

Lived Experiences of Teachers Who Undergone Attrition in the New Normal at a Private School Institution in Laguna, Philippines ¹Ella Mae V. Salipot & ²Marc Lester F. Quintana

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ABSTRACT

Teacher attrition presents a significant challenge to educational institutions worldwide, particularly in the post-pandemic era. This study investigates the lived experiences of teachers who have left a private school in San Pablo City, Laguna during this period. Utilizing a qualitative phenomenological approach, specifically transcendental phenomenology, the research delves into the experiences of seven former teachers, selected through purposive sampling to ensure diverse representation. Semistructured key informant interviews, validated by experts, were conducted to gather data, which was then analyzed using Moustakas' method of thematic analysis. Three major themes emerged: (1) Balancing personal and professional realities, encompassing managing commitments, evolving job demands, and mental health challenges; (2) Resources and resilience in creating a supportive environment, including institutional support, compensation, recognition, and professional growth opportunities; (3) Decision dynamics in navigating attrition, involving personal factors, career aspirations, and the pandemic's impact. The findings highlight the complex challenges contributing to teacher attrition and underscore the need for a holistic approach to support teachers' well-being, provide necessary resources, and address the multifaceted factors influencing their decisions. By understanding these dynamics, educational institutions can develop strategies to retain skilled educators and enhance their growth amidst evolving challenges.

Assessment of the Institution's Compliance with the Standards of Quality Education: Inputs to Development Plan

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ABSTRACT

Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) have become the trusted producers of countless generations of professionals who undeniably contribute to the attainment of the nation's development goals. Relatively, they are expected to become so responsive to the needs and demands of society. Thus, this study aimed to assess the compliance of the institution with the standards of quality education and used the results as a basis for the creation of a Development Plan. The researcher utilized a descriptive-normative design to compare the performance of the institution within the areas of quality education enumerated by the Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities Commission on Accreditation (PACUCOA). In addition, one hundred forty (140) respondents, chosen through fishbowl sampling, were asked to complete the adapted survey questionnaire composed of two sections - demographic characteristics of the respondents and the extent of the institution's compliance with the standards of quality education. Furthermore, the study revealed that most respondents perceived the institution's compliance with the quality education standards to a Very Great Extent (VGE). Moreover, the study also stressed that perception of the extent of the institution's adherence to the standards varies according to their academic program and sex. Meanwhile, based on the results, some of the indicators were perceived to be significantly affected by the respondents' age, year level, and enrolment status. Given these findings, undergoing accreditation must be given attention to ensure the delivery of quality teaching-learning processes deserved by all learners.

Development and Validation of Board-Games as Mathematical Instructional Materials ¹Grace Ordines De Eyoy & Rhett Hibaya Motus

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ABSTRACT

The COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated the learning challenges in mathematics among elementary and secondary students, particularly evident in Grade 6 pupils in New Washington. This study addresses the pressing need for intervention by focusing on developing and validating board games as instructional materials to enhance mathematical proficiency. Leveraging the effectiveness of board games as interactive tools, this research seeks to bridge the learning gap and engage students in a fun and impactful way. The study aims to identify the least learned competencies through pretests, develop suitable board games, assess their acceptability, and measure the impact on mathematical proficiency before and after exposure. Grade 6 pupils from a school in New Washington were selected for the study, and research instruments including competency assessments, pre-tests, post-tests, and an Evaluation tool for Acceptability were utilized. The data gathering involved three phases: preparation, iterative design, and iterative development. Prototypes of board games were created and refined based on feedback from teachers and students. The findings revealed a significant improvement in mathematical proficiency post-intervention, with developed board games being highly acceptable in terms of content and design. This study underscores the effectiveness of using board games as mathematical instructional materials, highlighting the potential of game-based learning in enhancing students' understanding and proficiency in multiplication and division. Recommendations include integrating board games into mathematics curriculum to address learning deficiencies and improve mathematical literacy among students.

DaMath in Improving Pupil's Basic Numeracy Skills

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ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to assess the effectiveness of using DaMath in improving pupil's basic numeracy skills. On the other hand, quasi experimental using the one group pre-test post-test was used as research design. The study utilized the Grade 3 pupils of a certain school in the District of Ibajay West, Division of Aklan, School Year 2023-2024 as research participants. Total enumeration was employed in this study. A researcher-made pretest and posttest was used as an instrument. After the test was answered, it was retrieved, reviewed, coded, encoded, and processed using the Statistical Package of Social Science (SPSS) Software v. 22. The level of numeracy skills of Grade 3 pupils in the pretest was high. Based on the result of the pretest, an intervention using Damath in improving pupils' basic numeracy skills. A posttest was administered after the intervention and the result showed that the level of numeracy skills of the participants was high. The pretest scores of the pupils in the mathematics before the exposure to DaMath is 36.34 and after the exposure, the mean score was notably increased into 44.96 with a Mean Gain of 8.61. This positive mean gain signifies an improvement in the mathematical performance from the pretest and posttest.

It provides a different route and flavor to instruction since the learning is more authentic, tangible and engaging. Lessons using DepEd are more directed, organized and assisted because the video itself is designed to facilitate the learning of students. The utilization of videobased instruction has its challenges and problem but the only way to combat this is to have Plan B. It is still helpful to have activities that will replace the absence of the video if something happens. Continued professional growth should be strengthened in order to help other colleagues in using video-based instruction. LAC session, peer tutoring and many more are just some of the ways to help capacitate fellow teachers on the use of video-based instruction. Feedbacks and suggestion of student still matters for the improvement and enhancement of the teaching-learning process.

Lived Experiences of Receiving Teachers Handling Learners with Special Needs

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ABSTRACT

This study explored the lived experiences of receiving teachers handling learners with special needs. The study uses qualitative research design, with semi-structured interviews as primary data collection method. The participants of the study were the seven (7) receiving teachers who have experience in teaching learners with special needs. The data collected from the in depth-interviews were analyzed using thematic analysis, with the aim of identifying the key themes. The study identified four themes: emotional challenges and rewards, professional support and training, advocacy and inclusion, and personal growth and fulfillment. The study identified five key challenges faced by receiving teachers, including delivery of instruction, sudden shift of pedagogy, limited resources, knowledge and time, lack of parental participation, and heavy workload. Coping mechanisms adopted by receiving teachers to address these challenges included seeking support from colleagues, time management, self-care and stress management, and professional development. The study also identified a range of strategies that receiving teachers use to support the learning and development of learner with special needs. These strategies include adapting teaching methods and materials to meet the individual needs of learners, providing additional support and resources, and building positive relationships with learners and their families. The study highlighted the importance of providing the receiving teachers with the training, support, and resources they need to effectively teach learners with special needs. The study also emphasizes the need for schools to recognize and value the important role that receiving teachers play in supporting the learning and development of learners with special needs.

Myths and Legends of Mt. Madja-As: Ecological Preservation Relevance to Araling Panlipunan ¹Romeo B. Telesforo & ²Cashmere Dy Buco-Ambay

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to explore the myths and legends surrounding Mt. Madja-as through the perspectives of local residents. The research sought to identify, document, and understand the cultural and ecological significance of these myths. Employing a qualitative research approach focusing on narrative description, the study engaged twenty participants, ten of whom underwent indepth interviews, while the remaining ten responded to survey questions. Inclusion criteria comprised residency of at least 10 years, knowledge of the myths, and a willingness to participate in interviews. Key findings revealed that the legend of Madja-as is an oral tradition passed through generations, conveyed via moral traditions, storytelling, festival reenactments, written materials, and peer narratives. Mt. Madja-as and the three associated islands emerged as cultural symbols denoting resilience and beauty. Although most participants had not visited Mt. Madja-as, experiences with nearby areas and the islands contributed to the ecological preservation of the region. Conclusions from the study underscored the persistence and cultural significance of the oral tradition, shaping the identity of Culasiños through annual reenactments and transmission from elders. Symbolic representations embodied by Mt. Madja-as and the islands were recognized as powerful icons reflecting resilience and beauty, extending beyond entertainment to play a vital role in shaping awareness and memories within the community. Moreover, the study found that the ecological preservation of the area was indirectly influenced by the legend, as the untouched beauty of Mt. Madja-as and the islands contributed to the environmental consciousness of the community, illustrating the interconnectedness of cultural narratives and ecological awareness.

ABSTRACT

This qualitative research utilizing narrative inquiry aims to determine the factors that motivate the 7 public school teachers to enroll master's degree program, the factors that hinder teachers not to continue master's degree program and their motivational support. In terms of the factors that motivate teachers in pursuing master's degree program, they primarily reckoned continuous personal and professional advancement. Mommy Don't Go: The Stories of Separation Anxiety of Kindergarten Pupils Thru the Lens of Mothers

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ABSTRACT

This phenomenological study aimed to explore the separation anxiety from home among kindergarten pupils of Ibajay Central School Colongcolong Annex School Year 2022-2023 from the perspective of their mothers. Using purposive sampling, five parents were selected as participants. Data were collected through face-to-face interviews using a researcher-made interview guide. The findings revealed that children exhibited excessive reliance on their parents, often requiring parental persuasion and showing trust only in their parents and close relatives. Parents noted that separation anxiety was linked to home training and parenting styles, which sometimes led to the child's fear of unfamiliar places and strangers, resulting in separation anxiety disorder. To address this, continuous parental support and understanding were deemed crucial. Parents faced challenges such as recurring issues, disruption of daily routines, and their children's difficulties in social interactions. Coping mechanisms included engaging children in social activities, fostering self-motivation, and providing consistent care. Through these efforts, parents developed resilience, which in turn helped their children become more self-reliant and confident. The study suggests that improving parents' understanding of separation anxiety, enhancing parent-child relationships, and incorporating spiritual guidance can expedite the recovery process and foster better outcomes for both parents and children. The research underscores the importance of comprehensive information dissemination and strong familial support in overcoming separation anxiety.

The findings of the study then served as the basis for the development of localized and contextualized learning materials that can be utilized in teaching Araling Panlipunan. Data were sourced from existing related articles and through interviews with ten study informants who were representatives from business, tourism, local government unit, craftsmen/artisans, and elders. The study was conducted for a three-month duration in Laua-an, Antique. Data gathered were presented and analyzed using a thematic analysis. This study found that the Pahinis festival was based on the common practice of pahinis, a cleansing ritual performed before the start of the muscovado sugar processing. This study presents the following recommendations: a thorough research on the history of the Pahinis festival including the its evolution as well as the changes cultural elements and activities through the years of celebrating it; enhancement of the educational and cultural value of the Pahinis festival to create an immersive and enriching experience for attendees while fostering a deeper appreciation for the community's traditions; and the pilot testing of the developed contextualized and localized learning material so that needed enhancement can be done after such

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ABSTRACT

Herbal medicines play an important role in treating various ailments due to their potentially high medicinal values and adequacy by patients with different health complications. This has been observed in a global system where herbal medicines treat various illnesses. In this context, the researcher gathered informative data that would help educators develop information and education communication materials for Hinterland herbal medicines. This study aimed to assess the Hinterland community's commonness, knowledge, and perception of traditional herbal medication. In-depth interviews were conducted with local medical practitioners and local households in the upland barangays of Pandan, Antique who experienced firsthand on the usage and practice of common herbal medicines using guide questionnaires. Thematic analysis was used to explore beliefs and attitudes towards herbal medicines. Three major themes were identified: healing practices, beliefs, and symbolism to herbal medicine used. Common herbal plants were enumerated by participants with the ways it was prepared and developed as a medication for the identified common health issues. The cultural aspect of utilizing herbal medications was also highlighted in the study. The findings provided an in-depth understanding of the local herbal practices in Hinterland for the benefit of developing curriculum instruction showcasing Hinterland herbal medicines. Educators may also utilize results to develop information and educational materials that will help in teaching healthrelated subjects. Moreover, the results and findings of the study will provide relevant information to future researchers conducting the same study as well as guide medical practitioners.

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ABSTRACT

This narrative inquiry research study delves into the realm of school bullying specifically exploring the experiences of bullied students and proposing guidance intervention program. Conducted at Valderrama Elementary School in Culasi Antique during the school year 2022-2023, the study included five elementary pupils who had fallen victim to school bullying, as documented by the designated teacher acting as the guidance counselor. Researcher meticulously crafted an interview guide based on existing literature and research studies, conducting data gathering from March 2022 to December 2023. To preserve participant confidentiality, pseudonyms were utilized throughout the discussions. Thematic Inquiry served as analytical approach resulting to prominent themes on the lived experiences of bullied students including verbal abuse, name-calling, physical abuse resulting in stressinduced symptoms, and discrimination during school activities. Proposed Guidance Intervention Program, as voiced by bullied students, centered around two key themes: the development of a school-based anti-bullying program and an initiative for disseminating information to learners, parents, and the community about the school- based anti-bullying policy. The study recommends the comprehensive capability building program titled "Bullying Prevention and respond Training", designed for teachers, parents, students, encompassing objective, defining bullying and understanding its form bullying, discussing report on prevalence and impacts, exploring intervention, best practices, identifying pathways for policy implementation, and organizing activities to foster bullying prevention at the school, community levels. Overall, the study sheds light on multifaceted aspects of school bullying, insights into the experiences of victims, and proposing tangible intervention strategies for a safer learning environment

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ABSTRACT

This research study aimed to find out the lived experiences of newly-hired teachers from private school in the District of Pandan. On the other hand, descriptive phenomenology research design was used. The study utilized seven (7) newly hired teachers from the four (4) public secondary schools in the District of Pandan, Division of Antique as participants. They were obtained using the purposive sampling in the identified schools from Patria National High School, Mag-Aba National High School, Sta. Ana National High School and Pandan National Vocational High School. The data were analyzed and interpreted using thematic analysis of Collaizzi's method. The research instrument used was in the form of interview guide. The lived experiences of the newly-hired DepEd teachers from the private school were categorized into the following subthemes; diversity in learners and family background, cultural adjustment and shock, and challenging yet fulfilling experience. The challenges encountered were categorized into the following subthemes: managing student behavior; lack of background knowledge and requirements; insufficient resources; adjustment in the work environment; and internet connectivity issues. Coping mechanisms were categorized into the following subthemes: collaborative approach; adaptability and time management; research and continuous learning and senior teacher mentorship. The study recommends the Department of Education to support these newly hired teachers to be well-adjusted and effective 21st century teachers through the teacher induction program highlighting different workshops, namely; technology integration workshop, critical thinking pedagogy seminar and inclusive classroom management workshop.

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to explore the integration and utilization of local arts and crafts in teaching Contemporary Philippine Arts from the Regions (CPAR) subject in Senior High School that will serve as the basis for an enhancement program. Employing a qualitative research design, this study was conducted in the District of Pandan, Antique of the Department of Education, with Senior High School (SHS) teachers handling the CPAR subject as key informants. This study found out that local arts and crafts integrated and utilized were those that were made from natural materials due to their commonality and availability in the locality and with the intention to promote them and to motivate learners. Those that were excluded were installation arts such as sculptures and architectural structures, arts and crafts that are scarce and with high material cost, and those that pose high risk and danger when making them. Related issues and concerns identified were inadequate skills, the lack of materials and equipment, and safety concerns. Best practices in teaching CPAR are art application and skills development, and capability-building/ skills enhancement activities. Recommendations include an inventory of local arts and crafts within the community, increased involvement in awareness-raising and promotion, sustained administrative support for professional development opportunities for CPAR teachers, sustained parental engagement to obtain their support, and sustained engagement with artisans.

Data were collected using interview guide for in-depth one-on-one interviews. Qualitative data gathered were analyzed thematically. Aetas possess a distinct identity that sets them apart as a unique group. They are determined to pursue their dreams. Their self-care practices include consulting traditional healers like Arbularyo. Aetas are adopting practices such as visiting health centers. Aetas remain proud of their identity and are committed to achieving their dreams. They blend traditional self-care practices with new lifestyle changes to improve their lives. This research provides a foundation for developing sustainable programs and measures to protect Aeta rights. It aims to enhance their acceptance in the community and support their aspirations, contributing to the creation of a healthy, dynamic, and holistic Aeta community. The findings will inform policy development for preserving their unique cultural heritage and traditions.

Crisis Management Practices of Elementary School Heads in Response to the CoViD-19 Pandemic and Beyond

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to determine the crisis management practices in response to the CoViD-19 pandemic and beyond of the public elementary school heads. Qualitative research design through indepth interviews and focus group discussion (FGD) were used to gather data while the phenomenological approach was employed to come up with the themes. Seven (7) purposively selected elementary school heads participated in this study. Results revealed five themes on their difficulties during the pandemic: unavailability of emergency response mechanisms, no standby funds for emergent crisis, lack of materials for independent learning, prohibition on teacher-learner interaction, and complications in tapping support from stakeholders. As to their difficulties during reversion to full in-person classes, the themes deduced were adjusting with the processes of schoolbased instruction, overcoming fear and anxiety, lack of school facilities to ensure learner safety and well-being, reluctance of parents to allow their children to attend face-to-face classes, and difficulty in crafting and implementing programs on learning recovery and continuity. As to their crisis management practices the themes were: attending trainings on crisis and emergency management, strengthening the SDDRMC, integrating school safety and emergency preparedness in the SIP, conducting regular mental wellness advocacy for teachers and learners, and institutionalizing stakeholders' support and participation.

Stories and Narratives of Pupils from the Hinterland

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ABSTRACT

This qualitative study is focused on the narratives and stories of pupils from the hinterland community in Sto. Rosario, Pandan, Antique. The study evaluated the situation and existing condition of the pupils of a public school in the lowland, the Sto. Rosario Elementary School (SRES). This study utilized the key-informant method in gathering data and narrative and thematic analysis in examining data. Key informants in this study were parents and pupils of SRES who live in hinterland. The study was conducted for three months. This study found that there is a glaring inadequacy of basic and school needs of pupils, a reality that their parents openly shared. They also had difficulty in their lessons. However, they found enjoyment in new learnings in school such as learning how to write, read, and understand lessons, while also fostering camaraderie with their fellow pupils and friends amidst adjustment and petty conflicts. Pupils got material and emotional support from their families, relatives, teachers, classmates, and friends. The proposed intervention is composed of two main focuses: direct intervention such as training for parents and the use of mobile learning solution; and establishment of linkages such as tapping agencies and alumni to help address pupil's concerns and needs. This study recommends the collaboration among various stakeholders to propose interventions to address inadequacy of basic needs, provision of extended learning opportunities such as after-school programs, workshops, or summer school to provide additional support for struggling pupils, and sourcing for sponsors of pupil's school needs and supplies.

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to explore the lived experiences, challenges encountered, and coping mechanisms of the Senior High School transferred-in learners at Pandan National Vocational High School and recommend programs to support them succeed in their studies. Phenomenological research design was utilized in this study. There were seven (7) participants in the study which were purposively chosen by the researcher. Researcher-made interview guide was formulated during the focus group discussion for data collection. The data gathered were subjected to content analysis to come up with significant meanings which were categorized into themes. The findings of the study revealed the following: (1) the cause of the transfer of the learners are the choice of the strand offerings of the school, the financial problem of the family, and the extracurricular activities of the learners; (2) the challenges encountered by the transferred-in learners are the volume of the school work, new routines, and social and emotional impact; (3) the coping mechanisms of the transferred-in learners include the power of friendship and peer support, the assistance and help from the teachers, and self-efficacy which is their ability to survive on their own. 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ABSTRACT

The purpose of this study was to determine the lived experiences of Madrasah learners in one of the elementary schools in the Division of Aklan. Phenomenological research design was used in this study. The study purposively included nine elementary Muslim learners, and this was obtained using the purposive sampling. Data gathering was conducted from August 2023 to November 2023. The experiences of the Madrasah learners underscore the holistic nature of Madrasah education, encompassing linguistic, cultural, and religious dimensions. Understanding Learners' Experiences on the Arabic Language and Islamic Values Education ¹Jella L. Sitao & ²Rhett H. Motus

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ABSTRACT

This study aims to explore the experiences, challenges and coping mechanisms of grades 4, 5 and 6 learners in ALIVE subject at Balabag Elementary School over the 2022-23 academic year through the Madrasah program. Pedagogical practices used as yardsticks for comprehensive analysis include time allocation and physical facilities to reveal how conventional methods interact with current ones. Some areas that need improvement are creating spaces solely for studies, effectiveness and challenges of homogenous grouping and repetitive drill, and tremendous constraints learning Arabic due to its foreign nature and dearth of resources. Moreover, there are also concerns that arise around reduced playtime on children's well-being while para-teachers play a crucial role in supporting students' learning as well as these media sources such as YouTube and TikTok. Limitations of the study may stem from concentration on one school in a particular academic year, limiting generalizability. Implications refer to continued exploration as well as action towards promoting inclusive education within Madrasah contexts by taking into account cultural, religious and pedagogical issues.

Students with Short Attention Span

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ABSTRACT

This phenomenological study aimed to document the experiences of teachers teaching students with short attention spans in learning. Five teachers and five students were selected using purposive sampling, and the researcher-made interview guide was used to capture the responses through Faceto-Face Interviews. The study revealed three primary experiences: extra frustrating and challenging experiences, student avoidance, and constant distraction with yawning mannerism. The teachers believed that the behavioral challenges were an innate mannerism of the students, not a result of their lessons. The challenges faced by teachers included inconvenient preparation of learning materials, struggle in disciplining students, difficulty determining appropriate learning styles, student inability to finish tests, and consistent diminishing academic performance. Teachers should aim to have students engaged, motivated, and interested in the lessons, but students may not always be able to stay engaged due to various reasons, such as lack of interest or boredom. Students experienced four events: frequent daydreaming, dizziness and sleeplessness, external distractions, and failure to understand lessons. These issues contributed to poor academic performance, poor memory, and difficulty in learning. Students also faced two main challenges: low academic performance and peer distractions, which may be due to their short attention span, leading to poor academic achievement and other related school prowess.

Lived experiences of Grade 6 Teachers Handling Learners with Disruptive Behavior

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ABSTRACT

This phenomenological study was conducted primarily to document the narratives of grade 6 teachers handling learners with disruptive behaviors. Five (5) teachers were included as participants of this study and were selected using purposive sampling. The researcher-made interview guide was utilized to capture the responses of the participants through the conduct of face-to-face interview aiming to understand their experiences, challenges, coping strategies and support needs. Data analysis involved thematic analysis to identify common patterns, themes, and sub-themes in the teachers' narratives. Preliminary findings indicate that grade 6 teachers face various challenges when handling learners with disruptive behavior, including disruptions to classroom routines, decreased instructional time, and negative impacts on the academic and social-emotional development of other learners. Teachers described feelings of frustration, exhaustion, and self-doubt in their ability to effectively manage disruptive behavior. Despite the challenges, teachers also highlighted strategies they employed to address disruptive behavior, such as establishing clear expectations, implementing behavior management plans, utilizing positive reinforcement, and collaborating with parents and support staff. Teachers emphasized the importance of building positive relationships with disruptive learners, understanding their underlying needs, and providing individualized support. The study contributes to the existing literature by providing insights into the lived experiences of grade 6 teachers handling learners with disruptive behavior. The findings have implications for teacher training programs, school policies, and the development of targeted interventions to support teachers in effectively managing disruptive behavior in the classroom.

An Assessment of the Efficacy of Cognitive Behavioral Intervention for Trauma in Schools among Student-Residents at the Manila Boys' Town Complex, Philippines Lovellene S. Bibat

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ABSTRACT

This study assessed the efficacy of the Cognitive Behavioral Intervention for Trauma in Schools (CBITS) in mitigating the impact of trauma on the behavior and academic performance of studentresidents at the Manila Boys' Town Complex, Philippines. Utilizing a pretest-posttest control group design, trauma symptoms were evaluated using the Trauma Symptom Checklist for Children (TSCC). The study included 20 participants, divided equally into experimental and control groups. Statistical analysis using the Wilcoxon Signed-Rank Test revealed no statistically significant differences between pretest and posttest scores across six TSCC subscales: Anxiety, Depression, Anger, Posttraumatic Stress, Dissociation, and Sexual Concerns, at the .05 significance level. Despite the lack of significant statistical improvement, median posttest scores for the experimental group were lower than those of the control group, with scores of 61.5, 60, 51, 55.5, 58, and 64, compared to 64.5, 59.5, 52, 58.5, 61, and 74.5 for the control group across the respective subscales. These results suggest that while CBITS did not produce statistically significant outcomes, it may have a potentially positive effect on addressing trauma-related issues. The findings highlight the complexities involved in trauma intervention within educational settings and emphasize the need for culturally and contextually tailored approaches. Future research should consider increasing sample sizes and further adapting CBITS to enhance the reliability and applicability of the findings. This study contributes to a deeper understanding of trauma intervention strategies in public schools and underscores the necessity for ongoing exploration to optimize support for vulnerable student populations.

Online Gaming Engagements, Mental Well-Being, and Work Performance Among Young Professionals: Basis for Psychosocial Intervention Program Development 1 Mark Paul O. Moraleja & 2 Elna R. Lopez

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ABSTRACT

Online gaming became part of people's lives since the introduction of the computer and internet even before studies which explore its advantages and disadvantages were taken into consideration. This study investigated the online gaming engagements, mental wellbeing and work performance of 103 young professionals of the 3rd district of Laguna. They were selected through purposive sampling. The study used sequential explanatory mixed method which combines quantitative and qualitative methods. Findings revealed that respondents have average gaming engagements, above average mental wellbeing and high work performance. The themes created were gaming attitude for online gaming engagements, healthy disposition for mental health and work attitude for work performance. It was also revealed that online gaming engagement and mental health is significantly related to work performance. The study proposed a psycho-social intervention program for young professional with high gaming engagements.

Parental Narcissism and Children's Mental Vulnerability: Mediation Role of Parental Bonding Styles

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ABSTRACT

Narcissistic parents tend to be extremely controlling, critical, and possessive of their kids. Thus, the hypothesis that parental narcissism is related to depression and anxiety of the young adult children and that this relationship is mediated by the parental bonding style as reported by the children is the investigation of this study. The participants of the study are 100 college students and their parents. The Narcissistic Personality Inventory (NPI) was used to measure parental narcissism, and the Parental Bonding Instrument (PBI), which incorporates Parkers' scales of care and overprotection, was used to examine the parenting style as recalled by the children; and Beck Depression Inventory (BDI) and 7 items of Depression, Anxiety and Stress Scale (DASS 21) to assess depression and lastly 20 items of Trait Anxiety Scale of State-Trait Anxiety Inventory (STAI) was used to measure anxiety. Two complete mediation models (one for mothers and one for fathers), with PBI scores as a predictor and parental NPI as mediators and children's scores on the BDI and STAI as criteria demonstrated adequate goodness of fit indices. The results revealed an indirect relationship in terms of maternal between care and depression and in paternal between care and overprotection. Furthermore, in both models, it showed also an indirect relationship between care and anxiety and a direct relationship between depression and anxiety. In conclusion, children who are highly bonded with the parents are likely to be less depressed and anxious and that children who develop depression are likely to have anxiety as well.

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ABSTRACT

This study conducted at Capiz State University, Mambusao Satellite College investigates the language diversity among students from different municipalities in Capiz, including Mambusao, Sigma, Sapian, Jamindan, and Dao. The research employed a qualitative approach within a variationist sociolinguistic framework to describe linguistic variations in various categories such as Material Culture, Human, Social Structure, Cosmology, Flora, Fauna, Food, Functional words, Verbs, Pronouns, and Interrogatives. The study utilized purposive sampling to select 25 participants from the five municipalities based on specific criteria. The output of the study, titled BLT2: "Bridging languages, Translating Terminologies," aims to preserve and record terminologies among the five municipalities, contributing to the documentation and preservation of local linguistic heritage.

Separation Anxiety, Adjustment and Loss Experiences Among Overseas Filipino Workers: A Multiple Case Study

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ABSTRACT

Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) played a crucial role in global labor markets, contributing significantly to the economic development of their homeland while facing unique challenges abroad. This study delved into the emotional complexities faced by OFWs in Japan, particularly on separation anxiety, adjustment, and loss experiences for the purpose of developing culturally sensitive and evidence-based psychological intervention programs tailored to the unique needs of OFWs in Japan, aimed at enhancing their resilience, coping skills, and overall mental well-being amidst these challenges. Through the use of multiple case studies, the research aimed to bridge existing gaps in mental health care services and developed intervention tailored to OFWs in Japan. It investigated the prevalence of separation anxiety, their adjustment, their loss experiences, and how these factors influenced their psychological and social well-being. The findings uncovered a myriad of universal challenges, including distress, adaptation, and emotional turmoil, alongside the individualized coping mechanisms employed by these individuals. Recommendations for interventions were formulated, encompassing the implementation of psychosocial support programs incorporating Narrative Therapy and Solution-Focused Brief Therapy approaches, family communication initiatives, mental health education supplemented by cultural immersion, and language acquisition. The study focused on a small, purposively selected group of OFWs in Japan, which may not be representative of the broader OFW population. This limits the generalizability of the findings. Through collaborative efforts among stakeholders, the study aimed to promote OFWs' emotional resilience and overall well-being amidst the multifaceted challenges of separation, adjustment, and loss experiences.

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ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to determine the level of teacher's well-being and organizational commitment in the District of Batan. Descriptive- correlation survey research design was used in this study. The elementary teachers in the District of Batan were used as respondents during the study investigation process. The data was analyzed and interpreted using frequency counts, percentage, weighted mean as the descriptive statistics and Gamma chi-square to understand the strength of the relationship between teacher's well-being and organizational commitment. The research instrument used was in the form of survey questionnaires. The level of teacher's well-being was found to be highly evident. In addition, the level of teacher's organizational commitment was found to be highly committed. Furthermore, the level of relationship between teacher's well-being and organizational commitment showed: emotional well-being with low relationship; physical well-being with moderate relationship; spiritual well-being with moderate relationship; intellectual well-being with moderate relationship; environmental well-being with low relationship; and financial well-being with very low relationship. The Kruskall-Wallis H Test, when applied to the data, revealed that there are significant differences between the respondents' profile in terms of age, highest educational level attained, net monthly income, employment status, source of income, number of financial management-related seminars attended, video conferences attended, or vlogs watched, and years invested in cryptocurrency, but not in terms of civil status and sex. Everyone who plans to start investing in cryptocurrencies and other risky securities should receive more education on financial management in general and cryptocurrency in particular. Conducting an in-depth study on the background and performance of cryptocurrencies will help to provide unbiased choices rather than relying solely on what is popular in social media. It is important to conduct further research into other sociodemographic traits and cryptocurrency properties that can influence the engagement of an individual in the cryptocurrency market.

The arts and crafts industry in Culasi, Antique, Philippines, is integral to local culture, tourism, and economic potential. This study examines the historical evolution and cultural significance of Culasi's crafts, aiming to assess their role in sustainable development. Rooted in the Componential Theory of Creativity, the research explores the creativity, skills, and motivation of artisans in Culasi. The study's conceptual framework highlights the interconnectedness of arts and crafts with cultural values and sustainability. Using a qualitative narrative approach, semi-structured interviews were conducted with seven experienced artisans. These artisans, including weavers and blacksmiths, were selected based on residency, experience, and willingness to participate. The findings reveal a diverse range of handicrafts in Culasi, categorized into woven items, blades, and farming tools. Craftsmanship significantly impacts artisans' income, supporting education and household needs, and is deeply rooted in familial traditions. Challenges identified include a lack of proposed programs to support the industry's growth and sustainability. However, artisans demonstrate sustainability efforts by independently sourcing materials through planting and capital generation. Passing down crafts to younger generations is deemed essential for continuity and sustainability. The study emphasizes the economic potential of Culasi's arts and crafts industry for tourism, local communities, and vocational education. It underscores the need for supportive programs to preserve cultural heritage and foster sustainable development. The findings contribute to understanding Culasi's unique arts and crafts scene, highlighting its importance for community livelihoods and cultural identity. Further research in this field could inspire initiatives to enhance the industry's sustainability and economic impact.

At a time when vocational education is increasingly recognized for its role in creating gainful employment opportunities and stimulating economic growth, this paper studied what higher learning institutions Technical-Vocational students prefer and how academically and skills-ready they are. Specifically, this study focused on the Senior High School students enrolled in the Technical and Vocational Livelihood Track at Buruanga Vocational School regarding the growing importance of vocational education in job creation and national support; this paper considered a critical period when students chose their academic paths. Utilizing a descriptive-correlational research methodology, this research examined the relationship between academic performance, skills preparedness, and higher learning institution preference. Grounded with Vocational Identify Theory to understand how TechVoc students perceived different career alternatives among 50 purposively selected completers. Each student responded to self-report survey questionnaires that revealed the graduate's academic preparedness and interest in various institutions. The results demonstrated a significant relationship between their readiness and preference for the institution. This study investigates land acquisition issues faced by land settlers using the evolutionary theory of land rights. It examines their rights to compensation, access to land-related information, documentation, legal protection, and equitable treatment. The research used statistical treatment, weighted mean, percentage frequency distribution, and chi-square test to analyze and interpret data. Based on the data collected, the summary finding reveal that the majority of the land settlers were male, married individuals who had completed high school education, additionally, these land settlers were predominantly under the age of 51-year-old and were primarily engaged in farming activities as farmers. They were classified as agricultural settlers based on their occupation agricultural and activities on the land. The level of familiarity of land settlers with their land rights, as indicated by an overall weighted mean of 3.77 was verbally interpreted as moderately familiar in contrast, in the process of acquiring land, the overall weighted of 3.27 was verbally interpreted as familiar. The extent of problems encountered by the land settlers, on land acquisition with an overall mean of 4.53 interpreted as very high. The issues faced by land settlers on land acquisition can lead to conflict and disputes over land ownership. These issues can cause tension and may escalate to violence. To mitigate these risks, it is essential to promote peaceful transaction with fair compensation for all parties involved in the land acquisition process. This approach can help potential conflict and ensure a fair and peaceful transfer of land ownership to land settler.

Liquidation of Allocated Funds for Public Elementary Schools Division of Aklan ¹Jennevev R. Indemne & ²Antonia S. Escalona

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to discover the factors affecting the liquidation report that leads to delayed or nonsubmission of the public elementary schools of the Department of Education – Division of Aklan. Using descriptive research method, the 46 public elementary school heads, teacher-in-charge, and head teacher from the District of Banga, Lezo, Makato, Libacao and Malay were surveyed using researcher-made questionnaire. Findings revealed that that demographic profile, timely submission of requirements, leveraging appropriate technologies, and addressing external factors are key determinants in facilitating the liquidation process. Findings underscore the factors influencing the utilization and liquidation of allocated funds in terms of provision and procurement within the public elementary education sector. Addressing these factors requires a comprehensive approach that involves improving budget allocation mechanisms, enhancing administrative capacity through training and support, promoting efficient resource management practices, and fostering transparency and accountability in financial transactions. A positive relationship exists between the factors affecting the liquidation of allocated funds of respondents and the extent of the factors affecting the utilization and liquidation of allocated funds. Recommendations include providing training sessions and capacity-building programs for school administrators and personnel involved in financial management, investing in modern accounting and reporting technologies and enhancing communication channels between the Department of Education Division of Aklan and public elementary schools. This study is only limited to the factors that affect the liquidation and the extent of utilization and liquidation of MOOE of the selected public elementary schools in the District of Banga, Lezo, Makato, Libacao and Malay.

Clients Satisfaction on the Online Appointment System of Philippine Statistics Authority Aklan

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ABSTRACT

This study was anchored on the Queuing Theory, which examines how lines develop, function, and malfunction. One solution to long lines is to use an online appointment system, which functions as a scheduler and eliminates, reduces queues. This study assessed the client's satisfaction on the online appointment system implemented in Philippine Statistics Authority Aklan. This study was conducted using descriptive research and test of association, which entails conducting a survey using a questionnaire-checklist. Chi-square, means, frequency, and percentage distribution, were the statistical methods employed. The level of significance was established at 0.05. The following summary of findings were obtained: Majority of the respondents were female, aged 21 to 29 years old. In terms of civil status, more than 90% were single or married/living together. Respondents that are bachelor graduates outnumber all other and unemployed respondents. Furthermore, the online appointment system received a satisfaction score of 91.24 based on the experience of the clients using the system. The appointment system's usability or user-friendly experience received the highest satisfaction score (95.7%), while the lowest score (87.37%) was given to the privacy and security feature, which still interpreted as "very satisfied". This indicates that the appointment system is functional and effective in terms of client service, but must continue to improve its privacy and security features to retain high client satisfaction. On the other hand, client's unfamiliarity with the appointment system appears to be the biggest barrier to its use, thus, conduct of information campaign may help address it.

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ABSTRACT

This study delves into the job satisfaction levels and underlying factors among employees, analyzing demographic profiles, job satisfaction extents, and influential factors. The respondents are employees of Social Security System of Panay Island. This study was conducted from July 2023 to December 2023 using descriptive research design. Assessment of job satisfaction indicates high satisfaction levels in meaningful work, career opportunities, and health and well-being. Factors affecting job satisfaction, such as workload dissatisfaction and ineffective management, are deemed serious. Statistical analysis reveals significant differences in job satisfaction levels and influential factors among respondents, rejecting the null hypotheses. The current study examines the pivotal role of psychological capital (PsyCap) in nurturing entrepreneurial resilience amid crisis events. Crisis situations, such as natural disasters, pandemics, or economic downturns pose substantial challenges to entrepreneurs, requiring adaptive responses to ensure organizational survival and growth. Theory of PsyCap comprehends individual psychological resources such as self-efficacy, optimism, hope, and resilience. This study investigates how these positive psychological characteristics contribute to entrepreneurs' ability to withstand adversity and sustain their entrepreneurial activities which might have been suffered due to setbacks during crisis events. In this study a mixed methods approach is employed, which is integrating qualitative interviews with entrepreneurs and quantitative surveys to gain a comprehensive understanding of the relationship between PsyCap and entrepreneurial resilience. Qualitative interviews offer insights into entrepreneurs' subjective experiences, coping strategies, and psychological processes during crises, while quantitative surveys allow the measurement of PsyCap elements and their impact on resilience. 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ABSTRACT

In today's career world, competition is high especially in the local labor market. It is deemed important for schools to prepare future graduates in their chosen field. This paper aimed to assess the Bachelor of Science in Office Administration curriculum expected learning outcomes outlined from CMO 19 series of 2017 and the graduates work performance. Descriptive-correlation analysis, stratified sampling technique were used in this study. The researcher-constructed questionnaire with acceptable consistency is the primary tool utilized. Out of 80 survey questionnaires given, 60 were retrieved. The findings revealed the high observance of the employers in the skills acquired by the graduates of BSOA from year 2019 – 2021. Furthermore, the employers viewed the graduates to be highly proficient in their work performance. Additionally, there is a significant relationship between the skills acquired by the graduates of BSOA and work performance in terms of job -specific tasks while in non- job specific task only administrative and human relation management skills, business communication and ICT skills and record management skills were significantly related. It is recommended that the University empowers the future graduates more by implementing approaches to teachers, curriculum, facilities, and partnership.

Acceptance of Artificial Intelligence in Selected Manufacturing Industries in San Pablo City: An Input on Human Resource Plan

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ABSTRACT

This study focuses on developing a Human Resource (HR) Plan for integrating Artificial Intelligence in HR management across selected manufacturing companies. It evaluated the AI literacy of HR employees, their perceptions of AI's usefulness and ease of use, the challenges they face with AI integration, and how AI is being developed within HR management. Employing a mixed-method design, the study gathered data from forty-eight (48) HR employees using a researcher-made questionnaire and conducted thematic analysis on interviews with 10 selected participants. The findings revealed that HR employees are generally literate in AI and believe it enhances their work productivity and performance. Interestingly, their general knowledge of AI did not significantly affect their perceptions of its usefulness or ease of use. The main challenges identified included the cost of technology, integration difficulties, data privacy and security issues, and the need for further capacity building. The study resulted in a comprehensive Human Resource Plan designed to guide the integration of AI into HR practices. The plan is recommended for broader implementation, with suggestions for evaluating its effectiveness, engaging in partnerships, conducting cost-benefit analyses, and formulating continuous learning plans. It advises companies to develop their own AI strategies that prioritize ethical practices, continuous learning, and a culture of innovation and security.

Utilization of Program Competencies in the Workplace of Bachelor of Science in Business Administration Graduates

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ABSTRACT

An impact assessment of a curriculum is important and necessary for adapting to the ever-evolving needs of education. This study aimed to determine the utilization of program competencies of the graduates from years 2019 to 2022 of the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration (BSBA) at the Laguna State Polytechnic University – San Pablo City Campus. Descriptive and quantitative research was utilized. A survey was administered to forty (40) employers of BSBA graduates. The questionnaire intended to measure the extent the graduates use the program competencies in their present work, which include being analytical of the business environment, creativity in the preparation of operational plans, innovation in coming up with business ideas, and the use of business research capability. The majority of the graduates are working in the financial and Business Process Outsourcing industry which is aligned to the curriculum of the BSBA program. All the program competencies are deemed to be practiced to a great extent except business research capability, which is assessed to be exercised to a low extent. Being creative in the preparation of operational plans differs significantly among the graduates when they are grouped according to year graduated and position. It is suggested that the curriculum of the BSBA program as well as the delivery of instruction for such curriculum should provide more emphasis on the conduct of business and marketing research that would enhance the equipment of the students with this program competency.

Internet Research for Business Modules and Students' Academic Performance

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ABSTRACT

It is crucial for educational institutions, specifically the teachers to understand the kinds of instructional resources that can be applied to every teaching and learning scenario. Generations of the students today are more inclined with technology in learning. This paper aims to evaluate the internet research for business modules and its relationship to the academic performance of the students. The study used a descriptive-correlation design. Data were gathered through online evaluation of the students using the official evaluation form of Curriculum and Instructional Development Office of the University. The academic performance was measured through the official grades of the students from two batches of 2022 and 2023. A total of 126 responses came from stratified random sampling, treated and computed accordingly. Results revealed a positive evaluation regarding the modules and the majority were in satisfactory ratings under the course. There is also a significant relationship between the modules and the academic performance of the students. It is recommended that educational institution continue to assist the faculty members in developing, publishing, and copyrighting the instructional materials.

Financial Literacy and Income Management of Public Market Business Owners

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ABSTRACT

Income management is essential to be able to provide for basic needs and attain financial well-being. This study intended to determine the income management of public market owners in the 3rd District of the Province of Laguna in the Philippines. Quantitative and descriptive research was utilized. A survey was administered to one hundred forty-five (145) business owners in the said locale. The questionnaire intended to determine the profile of the respondents, to measure the income management of the businessmen about attitude, behavior, and prioritization, and to determine significant differences in their income management. The majority of the business owners are from 36 to 65 years old, married, have dependents ranging from 2 to 3, are high school graduates, and are earning from P10,001 to P25,000 monthly. Sixty-one percent (61%) are interested in increasing their financial knowledge specifically about investing activities. Their interest in investing could be observed as ninety-two (92%) of the respondents consider planning and implementing an investment program to be very important. Most of the public market business owners consider themselves thrifty specifically comparing prices before purchasing an item. Aside from the basic family needs, they regard savings for family and providing for business rental payments to be prioritized. A significant difference in estimating how much they owe on all debts including business and personal loans was found when they were grouped according to civil status, number of dependents, and monthly income. It is suggested that government agencies provide investment training to this sector of the business industry.

Financial Performance and Sustainability of Rural Banks in CALABARZON Region, Philippines


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ABSTRACT

Satisfactory financial performance could contribute to the attainment of a business's financial sustainability goal. With the low sustainability record of rural banks in the Philippines, this study intended to determine the financial performance and sustainability of these institutions as well as to establish the relationship between the two variables. A descriptive and correlational research design was employed and the survey method was administered. The participants of the study consisted of fifty-nine (59) rural banks in the CALABARZON Region in the Philippines. The questionnaire measures the financial performance of the rural banks using the CAMEL rating analysis, the financial sustainability as proposed by Balasubramanian and Balaji (2022), and the correlation analysis using Spearman-Rho. Findings revealed that rural banks recorded satisfactory performance in terms rural banks capital adequacy, management efficiency, earnings ability, and liquidity. However, they are found to be not performing well regarding asset quality. Rural banks in Region IVA also perceive themselves as highly financially sustainable. A significant correlation was established between capital adequacy, asset quality, and financial sustainability. It is suggested that rural banks need to recalibrate the policies and strategies on credit risk management based on marketing research to improve their asset quality performance.

The Influence of CSR, Social Media Marketing and Store Environment on Customer's Purchase Intention of Cosmetic Products at Otto Retail Store, Chengdu, China

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ABSTRACT

Today's world of intense competition and shifting business practices has led to a huge increase in both client demand and retailer power. For producers to survive and prosper, a long-lasting relationship with consumers is essential. The cosmetics industry in China has experienced remarkable growth in recent years. After the US, the nation ranked as the second-largest cosmetics market globally in 2020. Therefore, the goal of this study is to look into the variables that influence Chinese customers' intentions to purchase cosmetics products in relation to CSR, social media marketing and store environment. Primary data was collected using questionnaires from 220 consumers from multiple cosmetics department stores located in Otto Retail Store in Chengdu, China. The findings derived from the Pearson Correlation Coefficients demonstrate a statistically significant positive association between three variables: CSR, social media marketing and store environment on customer's purchase intention of cosmetic products at Otto Retail Store, Chengdu, China. The results demonstrate a statistically significant and positive relationship between all three factors on customer's purchase intention of cosmetic products and are highly significant at 1% level. Store environment has the highest correlation with customer's purchase intention of cosmetic products (r=0.610, p<0.01), followed by social media marketing (r=0.567, p<0.01) and CSR (r=0.532, p<0.01). Results of regression analysis have been used to test all the hypothesis to ascertain the extent of relationship with the variables that measures factors affecting customer's purchase intention. All the three independent variables showed significant positive relationship with customer's purchase intention with p<0.005.

Budget Management and Execution of Public Market Entrepreneurs: A Phenomenological Analysis

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ABSTRACT

To sustain a business whether small or big, capital and manpower is not adequate. Indeed, budget management both for personal and business is necessary. This study a phenomenological analysis focused on the lived experiences of the public market entrepreneurs in the 3rd district of Laguna province. The researchers purposively chosen and interviewed four in each town or city, totaled 28 public market entrepreneurs from the district covering 7 towns and cities. The interview questions were validated by the consultants before the execution of the interview. Gathered data were transcribed, interpreted using thematic analysis and later subjected to peer debriefing. Results and findings revealed that most of the public market entrepreneurs are in the ages of middle to late adulthood with two or more dependents and fall under low-income earners. They believed that budget management is a key to financial success. Moreover, in budget planning, they are prioritizing food and business rent fees, they allocate budgets for payment of personal and business loans and no budget allotted for emergency purposes. Participants tends to borrow money from friends and family when experiencing emergencies whether personal or business-related matters.

Psychological Safety, Compassion Fatigue and Burnout among Mental Health Providers in Higher Education Institutions

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ABSTRACT

Mental health providers play a vital role especially in the educational setting. They deal with the students' adjustment to new environment, day-to-day experiences and career choices and the needs of the higher education institution they work with. This study is designed to explore the psychological safety, compassion fatigue and burnout experience of mental health providers in higher education institutions in Batangas province. Participants of this study were selected through purposive sampling. More so, this study used sequential explanatory mixed method which combined quantitative and qualitative method. Results showed that the respondents were experiencing low levels of psychological safety and average levels of compassion fatigue and burnout. Work relationship was the theme that emerged for the respondents' psychological safety while selfcare was the theme that emerged for both compassion fatigue and burnout. Results also suggests that respondents were vulnerable to psychological safety, compassion fatigue and burnout as the results revealed no significant relationship between the profile of the respondents and the three (3) variables. It was also found out that compassion satisfaction is negatively correlated with exhaustion, mental distance and overall burnout. Results also suggests that burnout is positively correlated to exhaustion, mental distance, cognitive impairment and the respondents' overall burnout. More so, it was found out that secondary traumatic stress is positively correlated with exhaustion, mental distance, cognitive impairment, emotional impairment and overall burnout. An intervention module tailored to the needs of the mental health providers in the province.

ABSTRACT

The aim of this study is to bridge the identified empirical research gap through a quantitative study. The identified research gap is that there is lack of evidence on the intervening effect of Green Human Resource Management (green HRM) on the relationship between leadership and green employee engagement in the Sri Lanka Navy context or in the international military context. The research objectives are to identify the impact of green HRM on green employee engagement; to identify the impact of leadership on green HRM; to identify the impact of leadership on green employee engagement; to identify the mediating effect of green HRM on the relationship between leadership and green employee engagement. A cross-sectional study was carried out. This study was done in a non-artificial environment; therefore, researcher's interference is minimal. The unit of analysis is an individual who is an officer in the Sri Lanka Navy. The sample size is 200. The Sampling technique is simple random. The study utilized the Partial Least Squares Regression (PLS) model using SMART PLS 4.0 software to assess the reliability, validity, and relationships among latent variables in both the measurement and structural models. Elementary Public School Teachers' Stress and Burnout: Causes and Coping Strategies 1 Cheryl C. Recaido & 2 Rebecca T. Barrios

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ABSTRACT

This study aimed to investigate the elementary public school teachers' stress and burnout and to find out the causes, coping strategies and proposed programs teachers use in the midst of many problems they face. The qualitative research design following a narrative inquiry approach was employed in this study. The participants of the study were seven (7) elementary public school teachers from the District of Laua-an, purposively chosen through a pre-set criterion. An in-depth semi-structured interview was utilized to gather the needed data through an open-ended guide questionnaire. The teachers were inquired on their stresses, burnouts, coping strategies they employed and the proposed program they wanted to utilize as an elementary public school teacher. Nevertheless, the results showed and concluded that elementary public school teachers experienced stresses and burnouts through insomnia, weight loss and mood swings, the causes of stress and burnout encountered by elementary public school teachers were caused by problems with colleagues, attitude of pupils and heavy workloads, the coping strategies they employed were doing relaxing activities and reaching out to others, and the proposed program they wanted to utilize is entitled "Stress and Burnout Management: A Seminar-Workshop to counter the stress and burnout experienced by Elementary Public School Teachers". Hence, the study recommended that Department of Education should consider the proposed program of the participants, they should conduct mental and psychological seminar and develop strategies to have a proper time management, as well as provide recreational programs and activities.

The primary goal of this study is to explore the nexus relationship between financial literacy and investment decision-making among social media influencers. Following the COVID-19 pandemic, the global perspective on business and financial instruments has undergone a transformation. The rise of influencer marketing and the impact of these personalities on consumer behaviour prompted many businesses to seek collaboration with these influencers to promote their business and brand for a significant amount of payments. With social media influencers earning considerable amounts of income, how their financial literacy impacts the investment decisions is paramount. Drawing upon the existing literature, this study examines the various financial aspects and factors which affect the investment decisions of the social media influencers. A total of 28 questions assessing financial literacy, investment decision and influential factors were asked to 70 respondents and several statistical tests were used to analyse the data collected. The findings reveal that financial literacy is positively correlated with the investment decisions of the social media influencers and factors play a vital role in deciding the avenue of investment. Respondents have good knowledge of the basic investment avenues such as savings schemes and limited or minimal knowledge of other significant financial aspects.

Isolation and Elucidation of the Structure of Organic Compounds from Ethanol Extract of Moringa Leaves (*Moringa Oleifera L.*) Using Nuclear Magnetic Resonance (NMR) ¹Firstca Aulia Rachma & ²Tunik Saptawati

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ABSTRACT

Indonesia, as a tropical country, has a large diversity of plants, one of which is Moringa (Moringa oleifera L.) which is a plant commonly used in spices, cosmetic oils, and can be used for medicinal therapy. To get a thick extract, the extract is evaporated in a water bath at a temperature of 37oC until a thick extract is obtained. The thick extract obtained during the extraction process was 52.59 grams with a yield of 10.52%. The CTA2 produced from the synthesis process is a yellow oil liquid and amounts to 1.49 CTA2 instrument can be seen in Figure 1 grams. The structure and spectra resulting from characterization using the 1H NMR.PAA synthesis is carried out by mixing Chain Transfer Agent (CTA2) as a RAFT agent and acrylic acid monomer in a certain ratio to obtain the desired BM, which is then initiated by AIBN into reactive free radicals so that the R group will be released and will be reinitiated by polymerized acrylic acid.

Plant-Based Leather Alternative from Banana (Musa acuminata × balbisiana var. Cardaba) Peels Reinforced with Snake Plant (Dracaena trifasciata) Fibers Kier P. Gasga

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ABSTRACT

The leather industry is considered as one of the most polluting industries. Moreover, synthetic leather that is plastic-based is not biodegradable and can release dangerous toxins. Plant-based leather is seen as an alternative to this product. Banana (Musa acuminata × balbisiana var. Cardaba) peel is considered as typical waste after consumption and when disposed of by local vendors and banana crisp industries. In this paper, banana peels are reinforced with fibers from a highly abundant yet underutilized snake plant (Dracaena trifasciata) to develop a novel leather alternative. Design of experiments method was employed in the study to determine the most desired formulation of the plant-based leather. Test runs were generated using Design-Expert® for optimization using quadratic modeling through Box-Behnken design under randomized Response Surface Methodology. Optimum condition of polymerizing agent (11.14% w/w), plasticizer (7.12% w/w), and fiber (1.46% w/w), with 0.992 desirability, yielded tensile strength of 3.51±0.11 N/mm2, tear strength of 42.18±N/mm, 21.59±0.10% elongation at break, and 87.07±0.13% elastic modulus. Consumer acceptability was also determined using a validated 9-point scale questionnaire (α =0.883; ω =0.934) wherein respondents strongly agree with visual acceptability ($\overline{x}=8.16\pm0.84$), willingness to use ($\overline{x}=8.38\pm0.64$), and willingness to substitute to animal leather ($\bar{x} = 8.38 \pm 0.64$), and agree with tactile acceptability ($\bar{x} = 8.08 \pm 0.80$), perceived durability ($\bar{x}=7.86\pm0.76$), and general satisfaction ($\bar{x}=8.10\pm0.79$). The study exhibits the potential for agricultural wastes to be upcycled into high-performing, sustainable materials further, demonstrating the capability of the fabricated plant-based material as a sustainable alternative in the leather industry.

Optimization Sodium Alginate and Calcium Chloride (CaCl2): The Nanoparticles of Celery

(Apium Graveolens L.) Extract

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ABSTRACT

Celery (Apium graveolens L.) contains flavonoids, which are helpful for anti-inflammation. Celery will be extracted and made into a nanoparticle system, then formulated in a gel dosage form. Nanotechnology can improve drug bioavailability and the accurate release of active substances. Sodium alginate has a lot of functional groups that allow it to bind enough active ingredient molecules, and the positive ion charge will cross-link with the negative ion charge of calcium chloride (CaCl2). To obtain optimal concentrations of sodium alginate and CaCl2 to make celery nanoparticles and to obtain information on the physical characteristics of celery extract nanoparticles. Optimization of the celery extract nanoparticle formula using the simplex lattice design optimization method with the help of Design-Expert Software. optimal nanoparticle formula with a sodium alginate concentration of 0.600% and a CaCl2 concentration of 0.400%, a desirability value of 0.948, and a transmittance value of 99.8967. Then, samples with 1 mg/ml and 25 mg/ml were observed for particle size, and results were obtained at 1175 nm and 2682 nm, respectively.

Formulation of Kemangi Leaf Extract Effervescent Tablets (*Ocimum sanctum L.*)

ABSTRACT

Kemangi (Ocimum sanctum L) is one of plant used as a food ingredient. The secondary metabolite content in kemangi leaves has the potential to be used as an active ingredient in pharmaceutical preparations, one of which is effervescent tablets. The aim of this research was to obtain a kemangi extract effervescent tablet formula (Ocimum sanctum L) that fullfill the physical characteristic and stability requirements. Preparation of kemangi extract efferfescent tablets using the wet granulation method with additional ingredients include of tartaric acid, citric acid, Na Bicarbonate, PVP, aspartame and lactose. The formulation of kemangi effervescent tablet uses extracts with varying concentrations of 10%, 15% and 20%. The resulting efferfescent tablet preparation has a characteristic flat round shape, green color with a distinctive kemangi odor. Effervescent tablets have dissolution rates of 1.27, 1.19 and 1.12 minutes respectively. Tablet hardness was respectively 6.67, 6.29 and 5.10 kg. The degree of acidity (pH) was 6.02, 6.10 and 6.22, the tablet friability was respectively 0.11%, 0.44% and 0.89%. The research showed that all formulas fullfill the requirements for the physical characteristics of tablets. Formula I with 20% of kemangi extract is the most optimal formula as an effervescent tablet with the best dissolution rate.

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ABSTRACT

This paper introduces the ParSU Web Portal for Online AACCUP Accreditation (ParSU-WebPOA), a web-based system developed at Partido State University (ParSU) to enhance the accreditation process of the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP), Inc. Crafted through a descriptive developmental approach to research, the study focuses on web design, development, and evaluation. By utilizing cloud storage services, ParSU-WebPOA centralizes access to AACCUP survey instrument documents while granting document owners control over viewing and downloading permissions. Designed as a generic system for State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) lacking a dedicated web system, this standardized solution offers value to educational institutions seeking an efficient and user-friendly online accreditation platform. Regarding system evaluation, the study employed the Technology Acceptance Model (TAM) to evaluate user perceptions. The results indicate a strong consensus on the system's usefulness and ease of use, with anticipated improvements in job performance, productivity, and effectiveness. However, these results are limited to Partido State University. Given the system's potential utility for other SUCs, the study suggests conducting simultaneous testing with users from diverse institutions to gather their feedback and integrate the findings into future enhancements. Nevertheless, the results presented in this study can already serve as an indicator of the potential success of the system's implementation, benefiting both educational institutions and the AACCUP accrediting body.
